

Athletic Hall of Fame Inducts Eight in 2009

St. Cloud State held its 2009 Athletic Hall of Fame induction ceremony on Oct. 24.

Six former athletes and two coaches were inducted. With the induction the Athletic Hall of Fame numbers 163 individual members and three teams. The induction ceremonies take place every two years.

Brenda Meyer Corrow

Basketball, 1992-96

As a senior member of the St. Cloud State women's basketball team, Brenda Meyer Corrow was named the MVP of the North Central Conference, becoming the first SCSU women's player to be so honored. And today, she is one of only two SCSU players to be named league MVP.

Corrow had an outstanding basketball career with the Huskies from 1992 to 1996 during which she scored 1,384 career points and pulled in 863 rebounds. She was a three-time All-NCC team selection and won the league scoring and rebounding titles her junior and senior seasons. As a senior, Corrow ranked 20th in NCAA Division II scoring with a 21.5 points per game average. She was named to the Kodak Honorable Mention All-American team, CoSIDA Honorable Mention All-American squad, and to the Kodak All-District VII Team. Corrow wrote her name in the St. Cloud State record book leaving her mark among the top ten in ten categories.

Diane Heydt

Swimming and Diving Coach, 1988-2000

Diane Heydt coached the St. Cloud State women's swimming and diving teams for 11 seasons and the men's swimming and diving squad from six seasons from 1988 to 2000. She was one of the first women in NCAA Division II to coach a men's swimming and diving team. As the women's coach, Heydt coached 89 All-Americans and two NCAA Division II National Champions in divers Mary Ahlin, a four-time national champion, and Sarah Loquai, the first diver in the history of the University to win an NCAA individual title in 1997. She also coached 23 North Central Conference Champions and was named the NCC Swimming Coach of the Year in 1992 and 2000. During Heydt's tenure, every school record was broken. As head coach of the men's team, Heydt coached 28 All-Americans and compiled a dual meet record of 22-17-1. Her men's team produced 15 North Central Conference champions under her watch and broke nearly half the SCSU records during her tenure. In 1999, the men's squad finished 16th at the national championships.

Dustin DeRosier

Track & Field, 1992-97

A 1997 NCAA Division II National Championship and NCAA record in the pole vault were the ultimate accomplishments for pole vaulter Dustin DeRosier during his career at St. Cloud State spanning 1992 to 1997. DeRosier captured two North Central Conference Championships in 1997, winning the indoor pole vault with a conference record 17'4" vault. During the outdoor season, he won the outdoor vault with a mark of 16'3". His national experience included a championship in the indoor vault and second place in the outdoor vault in 1997, a fourth place finish in the 1996 indoor vault, and a sixth place finish in the 1996 outdoor vault. He gained four All-American titles for those finishes. In addition to his athletic talent, DeRosier was a five time Academic All-American.

Jeff Saterdalen

Ice Hockey, 1988-1992

Jeff Saterdalen was one of the pioneers of NCAA Division I hockey at St. Cloud State University. Saterdalen joined the team in 1988-89, the second season of NCAA Division I competition at SCSU, and immediately helped establish the Husky hockey program as a competitive force in the world of big-time college hockey. From 1988 to 1992, Saterdalen scored 78 goals and 101 assists for a total of 179 career points. He still owns team records for most career points and career assists, and he ranks second in the team record book for most career goals. Saterdalen also helped the Huskies gain their first-ever NCAA Division I tournament bid in 1989. Saterdalen ranks among SCSU's top 10 in several season record categories. A two-time team MVP, Saterdalen helped guide the Huskies into the Western Collegiate Hockey Association and was named to the All-WCHA Honorable Mention list in 1991-92 and the Academic All-WCHA squad in 1990-91.

Larry Sundby

Tennis

In the past half century, Larry Sundby's name has been synonymous with the sport of tennis at St. Cloud State University and in the tennis playing community of Central Minnesota. Sundby played tennis for the Huskies beginning with the 1959-60 season. He was a four-year starter at singles and doubles. As a senior during the 1962-63 season, Sundby played both number one singles and number one doubles, served as a team captain and was named SCSU's team MVP while gaining conference runner-up honors. Sundby returned to his alma mater for one season as a coach in 1971, and directed the men's tennis team to a perfect 14-0 record and a first place finish in the Northern Intercollegiate Conference. In 1988, Sundby was named the women's tennis coach at St. Cloud State University. He served in that capacity for 18 seasons and charted a 311-129 record during his tenure as head coach for the Huskies from 1988 to 2005. His teams won three North Central Conference championships and also captured coveted NCAA Division II tournament bids in 1995, 2003, 2004 and 2005. In 1988 and 1991, Sundby earned NCC Coach of the Year accolades. Sundby continues his affiliation with the Husky tennis program by serving as an assistant coach for the SCSU men's and women's tennis teams under the leadership of coach Jerry Anderson.

Michelle Nelson LeBow

Cross Country, Track & Field, 1988-92

To this day, Michelle Nelson LeBow is the greatest distance runner in St. Cloud State history, having run for the Huskies from 1988 to 1992. She still holds six school records in the distance events, including the 1500, 3000, and 5000 meter events in indoor track, and the 3000, 5000, and 10,000 meter events in outdoor track. LeBow was a four-time All-American in track and field from 1990 to 1992 and a cross country All-American in 1991. She was a five-time North Central Conference champion, winning conference titles in the indoor 10,000 meters in 1990 and 1991, the indoor 3000 meters in 1991 and the outdoor 3000 meters in 1991 and 1992. She also made her mark on the national scene with two second place finishes in the 10,000 meter run at the 1990 and 1991 NCAA Division II Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Nate Toedter
Wrestling, 1985-89

A two-time North Central Conference champion at 190-pounds in 1988 and 1989, Nate Toedter gained NCAA Division II All-America honors three times during his collegiate wrestling career at St. Cloud State. As a testimony to his prowess on the mat, Toedter was invited to the NCAA Division I championships in 1989 and earned All-America honors with an eighth place finish at the DI tournament that season. Toedter charted a 30-10 record for the Huskies in 1986-87, and then followed with a 33-4 record in 1987-88 on the way to his first conference title. To cap his senior season, Toedter posted a 37-6 record that included another NCC title along with a third place finish at the NCAA Division II championships.

Sheri Mandell Carlson
Volleyball, 1986-89

Nearly 20 years after playing her last match in a St. Cloud State volleyball uniform, Sheri Mandell Carlson still holds the school records for solo blocks in a career and block assists, and no one has come close to matching her. In fact she led the Huskies in blocks in each of her four years on the squad (1986-89). In addition she connected for 1,173 kills which ranks sixth on the all-time attacks chart. Carlson was named to the All-North Central Conference Team three times during her career, including first team honors in 1988 and 1989. In 1988 and 1989 she led the NCC in blocks per game. She was named to the AVCA North Central Region team in 1988 and 1989. Carlson still holds the single season records for blocks and block assists. In addition she ranks among the top ten in several categories. The Huskies won 94 matches during Carlson's career. During her four-year career, the Huskies earned national rankings, going as high as 13th in 1986, a top 20 ranking throughout the 1987 season, and as high as 12th in 1988. The 1988 Huskies advanced to the NCAA Division II North Central Region Tournament and won three Invitational Championships.
