Huskies Host Missouri Western in Hall of Fame Game: St. Cloud State (7-2, 3-2 North Central Conference), ranked 17th in both the AFCA Division II Coaches Poll and the D2football.com poll this week, will host Missouri Western State University (7-2, 5-2 Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Conference) in a non-conference game on Saturday, October 29. The kick-off is scheduled for 1:00 p.m. at Husky Stadium (4,198) on the SCSU campus. Saturday is the annual Hall of Fame Game for the Huskies.

2005 Hall of Fame Class: St. Cloud State University will induct five new members into the Athletic Hall of Fame on Saturday. The inductees include track and field star Becky Anderson Enebak; football, basketball and baseball standout Gary Frericks; All-American basketball player Reggie Perkins; former men's basketball coach Butch Raymond; and women's athletics pioneer in volleyball, basketball and softball Rosie Silbaugh Stallman. This is the 24th year of the SCSU Hall of Fame and this year's group of inductees brings the membership to 148 former players, coaches, administrators and supporters.

Ticket Information: For single game tickets, call 308-2137 or 1-877-SCSUTIX. Ticket prices are \$10 for adults and \$5 for students two years and older. SCSU students gain free admission with an SCSU ID.

Husky Village: For the second straight year, fans can participate in Husky Village activities prior to the start of all home Husky Football games. Husky Village is located south of Husky Stadium on Herb Brooks Way. Activities will include Party Time inflatable games, music sponsored by Regent Broadcasting, games, food and beverage, and family fun.

Media Coverage: Saturday's Husky Football game will air on AM 1240 WJON. Sports Director Jay Caldwell is in his eighth season as play-by-play announcer for the Husky broadcast. He will be joined in the booth by Joe Erickson as the color analyst. South Dakota is fourth, Nebraska-Omaha fifth, and Minnesota Duluth 11th in the Region. SCSU's opponent Missouri Western is ranked sixth in the Southwest Region this week.

2005 Husky Notes...

SCSU Head Coach Randy Hedberg: SCSU head coach Randy Hedberg (Minot State 1977) is in his seventh season with the Huskies in 2005. He has a current record of 39-35 at SCSU and is 84-58-2 overall in 15 plus years as a collegiate coach. He netted his 75th career coaching win against UND on October 2, 2004 and his 30th with the Huskies. The Huskies won the NCC title in 2002, which marks the second



time in team history that SCSU has won the NCC title. In 2004 SCSU posted an 8-3 record, and hosted the University of North Dakota in the first round of the NCAA Division II playoffs. The Parshall, N.D. native has been the head coach at Minot State (1982-89), assistant coach at Central Missouri State (1990-95), and an assistant coach at North Dakota (1996-98). Hedberg was an honorable mention All-America quarterback at Minot State. He was drafted by Tampa Bay of the NFL in 1977, and played with the Bucs through 1978. He also played with the Oakland Raiders (1979) and Green Bay Packers (1980).

Assistant Coaching Staff: The 2005 assistants include Paul Rudolph (Off. Coordinator/Off. Line), Scott Underwood (Def. Coordinator/Secondary), Steve Gruit (Defensive Line), Steve Crutchley (Wide Receivers), Derek Johnson (Running Backs), Eric Mattson (Linebackers/Strength & Conditioning), Ryan Mills (Tight Ends), Andrew Tippins (Defensive Line), Brian Frana (Offensive Line), Michael Rowe (Defensive Backs), Josh Stephan (Linebackers).

At Husky Stadium: The 2005 season will mark the second year in SCSU's new home, Husky Stadium, located on the banks of the Mississippi River. St. Cloud State posted a 4-2 record at Husky Stadium in 2004, including a 0-1 mark in an NCAA playoff game in the new facility. Last season, the Huskies averaged 3,772 fans in the 4,198 seat facility. SCSU's first sell-out was on October 2, 2004 against the University of North Dakota.



Pre-Season All-American Honors: Several Huskies have received 2005 preseason All-American honors. Leading the way is junior defensive back Mitchell Denne (St. Cloud) who has been named to three preseason teams. Denne has been honored as a Street & Smith's Division II preseason All-American, a Don Hansen Football Gazette preseason All-American and CollegeSportsReport.com Division II preseason All-American. Senior running back Matt Birkel (Ellsworth, WI) has been honored twice by Don Hansen and CollegeSportsReport.com. Senior quarterback Daniel Kaczor (St. Cloud) and senior wide receiver Ed DeShazer (Milwaukee, WI) were named to the 2005 Don Hansen Football Gazette preseason All-American team.

2005 Team Captains: Four Huskies will serve as captains in 2005. Representing the offense will be #16 senior quarterback Daniel Kaczor (St. Cloud) and #78 senior right tackle Jon Scovill (Wayzata). On defense the Huskies are represented by #54 senior linebacker Mark Henderson (Madison, WI) and #18 senior defensive end Charlie Cosgrove (Minneapolis).

### 2005 Husky Notes...

**All-Time Record:** The 2005 season marks the 83rd in the history of SCSU football. Since 1920, SCSU has compiled a 369-326-23 overall record and it has won a total of 18 conference titles, two in the NCC (1989, 2002), 14 NIC crowns and two Minnesota State College Conference titles.

**2004 SCSU Season:** The 17th ranked (AFCA) SCSU football team recorded an 8-3 overall record and a 4-2 mark, good for a second place tie in the NCC in 2004. SCSU advanced to the first round of the NCAA Division II Football Playoffs. The Huskies, ranked #4 in the Northwest Region, hosted fifth ranked University of North Dakota. UND won a thriller 20-17 in double overtime.

**St. Cloud State/Missouri Western:** This is the first meeting between St. Cloud State and Missouri Western on the football field.

**The Randy Hedberg Show:** The Randy Hedberg Show airs on Tuesday nights throughout the 2005 SCSU football season on AM 1390 The Fan. The program will originate from the Ground Round in St. Cloud. This week the show will be broadcast live from 6:05 to 6:45 p.m. The show features SCSU head football coach Randy Hedberg, WJON Sports Director and SCSU football play-by-play announcer Jay Caldwell, and color analyst Joe Erickson. Weekly guests will include SCSU offensive coordinator Paul Rudolph, SCSU defensive coordinator Scott Underwood, and a phone interview with the head coach of the opposing team.

**Last Week vs. Nebraska-Omaha:** The University of Nebraska-Omaha upset St. Cloud State 38-21 in a key North Central Conference game played in Omaha, Nebraska.

The 24th ranked (D2football.com) Mavericks jumped out to a 21-0 lead in the second quarter but the Huskies came back with 21 points of their own to tie the game with 4:22 left in the third quarter. Nebraska-Omaha scored the go ahead touchdown on a 26-yard run by running back Kyle Kasperbauer with :01 second left in the third quarter. UNO increased the lead to 31-21 on a 39-yard Andy Severson field goal with 6:03 left in the fourth quarter. The final blow came on a 19-yard Kasperbauer touchdown run, his third of the day with 2:10 left in the game. Kasperbauer finished the game with 35 carries for 179 yards and three touchdowns. SCSU was led by senior wide receiver Ryan Koch. Koch had a career high ten catches for 124 yards and two touchdowns. Sophomore wide receiver Ryan Jensen caught his first touchdown pass of his career with the Huskies. SCSU quarterback Daniel Kaczor finished the game with 20 of 38 passing for 231 yards and three TDs. He equaled his career high in pass attempts with 38. SCSU defensive end Charlie Cosgrove notched one quarterback sack for a career total of 22. He is .5 sacks short of tying the school record. Junior defensive back Tate Wheeler led the Huskies with 15 tackles. Nebraska-Omaha rolled up 428 yards on offense and held the Huskies to 317 yards. St. Cloud State scored its first touchdown of the game with 1:13 left in the second quarter, a 15-yard pass play from Daniel Kaczor to wide receiver Ryan Koch, capping a four play, 42 yard drive that took :41 seconds. The Mavericks took a 21-7 lead into halftime but the Huskies found the end zone less than four minutes into the third quarter when Kaczor found Koch on a five yard touchdown pass at 10:56. St. Cloud State tied the score 21-21, capping a 12 play, 82-yard drive with a one-yard touchdown pass from Kaczor to sophomore wide receiver Ryan Jensen at the 4:22 mark.

### Husky Player Notes...

**Harlon Hill Candidate Matt Birkel:** Senior running back Matt Birkel (Ellsworth, WI), a 2005 Harlon Hill candidate, was held below the 100-yard rushing mark for the second time this season. Birkel had 20 carries for 87 yards in the loss to UNO on Saturday. He has rushed for over 100 yards in seven Husky games this season. This season he has 205 carries for 1,159 yards and 14 touchdowns. This marks the second straight season that Birkel has gone over 1,000 yards. Birkel's 1,000 yard season is the 11th in the history of SCSU football and he is the third Husky to have back-to-back 1,000 yard seasons. He has rushed for over 100 yards 25 times during his collegiate career. He has gone over the 200 yard mark six times in his career. He rushed for a career high 236 yards on November 2, 2002 against the University of Nebraska-Omaha. He is the third Husky in school history to rush for over 4,000 yards in a career and currently has 4,521 yards. He needs 98 rushing yards to move into second place on the all-time rushing chart at SCSU. Harry Jackson (4,889) and Randy Martin (4,618) are the only other members of SCSU's 4,000 yard club. Birkel holds the school record for career touchdowns with 51. Birkel's name can be found on three preseason All-American lists. He has been honored by D2Football.com, Don Hansen, and CollegeSportsReports.com.

**Koch Pulls in Career Game High:** Senior wide receiver Ryan Koch (Madison, WI) caught a career high ten passes against UNO last Saturday. He finished the day with ten catches for 124 yards and two touchdowns. Koch has caught at least four passes in each of the Huskies' games this season. He has also caught at least one touchdown pass in seven games this season. Koch is the fifth Husky to go over the 2,000 yard receiving mark in a career and currently ranks fourth all-time with 2,477 yards. He has moved into second in career pass receptions with 174 (career record is 202 held by Mike McKinney). His 32 touchdown catches place him second on the all-time chart for receiving TDs (record is 43 held by Ben Nelson). For the season, Koch has a team high 55 catches for 799 yards and 12 touchdowns. His 55 catches in a season is the third best in SCSU history. Koch is one of 20 NCAA Division II football players to be a finalist for the 2005 Draddy Trophy given by the National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Hall of Fame. The Draddy Trophy is known to many as the "Academic" Heisman.

**Cosgrove Nears Sack Record:** Senior linebacker Charlie Cosgrove (Minneapolis) needs just one quarterback sack to become SCSU's career leader. Cosgrove tallied one QB sack against UNO on Saturday, and has 22 in his career. The career record of 22.5 is held by Brent Graunke (1996-99). Last week, Cosgrove established a new career mark for tackles for loss and currently has 45.5 (the old mark of 44 was held by Graunke). Cosgrove has 36 tackles this season, including a team high 13.5 tackles for loss. He has six QB sacks on the year and seven QB hurries.

**Hackett Catches On:** Senior tight end John Hackett (Prairie Du Chien, WI) continues to catch the ball for the Huskies. He has 17 catches over the last four games, including four receptions for 34 yads at UNO. He has caught at least one pass in each of the Huskies games this season. Hackett caught a career high seven passes against Augustana on Oct. 8 and had a career high 87 yards receiving against UND. Hackett ranks third in SCSU receiving with 26 for 344 yards and one touchdown. He caught his first touchdown pass of the season against UND (second of his career), since moving from the defensive side of the ball in the 2004 season.



### **Husky Player/Team Notes...**

**Kaczor Equals Career High in Attempts:** Senior quarterback Daniel Kaczor (St. Cloud) equalled his career high in pass attempts with 38 against UNO on Saturday. Kaczor completed 20 of 38 pass attempts for 231 yards and three touchdowns. He is the seventh Husky quarterback to pass for 4,000 yards in a career and currently ranks fifth in all-time passing yards with 4,570. His career marks are 334 of 565 passing for 4,570 yards and 43 touchdowns. He is tied for second in TD passes on the all-time chart. Kaczor has completed 153 of 246 passing attempts for 1,952 yards and 18 touchdowns this season. This season, Kaczor had a career high 22 completions against MSU. He threw for a career high 312 yards against UMC earlier this year.

**DeShazer Nears 2,000 Yard Mark:** Senior wide receiver Ed DeShazer (Milwaukee, WI) is closing in on the 2,000 yard career receiving mark. He currently has 1,984 receiving yards which includes 27 catches for 403 yards and two touchdowns this season. He would become the sixth Husky to gain 2,000 receiving yards in a career.

**Wheeler Tackles Season High:** Junior cornerback Tate Wheeler (Neenah, WI) had a season and career high 15 tackles against UNO. Wheeler ranks second on the team in defense with 57 tackles. He has a team high three interceptions this season.

**Kroll Gets Career High:** Junior defensive lineman Jordan Kroll (Mukwonago, WI) had a season and career high three tackles for loss against UNO on Saturday. Kroll finished the game with four tackles, including one quarterback sack. Kroll leads the Husky defense this season with 6.5 quarterback sacks.

**Husky Sacks:** The Huskies have recorded at least one quarterback sack in each game of the 2005 season. Earlier this season, SCSU set a school record with nine QB sacks at Western Washington. The Husky defense has accounted for 34 sacks this year. The school record for sacks in a season is 40 posted in 1991.

**Braunagel Nears Marks:** Senior placekicker Shawn Braunagel (Fargo, ND) currently ranks second in points scored on the all-time place kicking chart. Braunagel has 201 career points and the school record is held by Dan Pridon (1988-91) with 205 points. Braunagel has 26 career field goals which ranks him third behind the school record of 34 held by Pridon.

**Happy to Be Home:** St. Cloud State will play its final two games of the season at home. After hosting Missouri Western, the Huskies will finish the regular season as host to Minnesota Duluth on November 5 (1:00 p.m.). The Huskies are 4-0 at home this season and 8-2 all-time at Husky Stadium. SCSU is 8-1 in regular season games played at the new Stadium and 0-1 in NCAA playoff games.

**Scouting Missouri Western...**

Missouri Western Last Week: Missouri Western won its fifth straight game of the season with a 43-17 victory over Southwest Baptist in a Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA) game. The Griffons were led by Jeremiah White who rushed for 160 yards and two touchdowns. Missouri Western scored three times to take a 20-0 lead in the first quarter. The Griffons added 13 points in the second quarter. Southwest Baptist scored 14 points in the fourth quarter. For the game, Western had 510 yards of total offense, gaining 343 of them on the ground. Quarterback Michael Burton went 8-of-10 for 147 yards and two touchdowns, one of which was a 75-yard strike to Jarrett Brooks in the 2nd quarter. Brooks recorded two catches for 85 yards and one score. Runningback Jamison Burns added 17 carries for 88 yards and one touchdown for the Griffons. The Western defense limited SBU to 301 yards of offense, including a 195 rushing average on the ground, 50 yards shy of its season average.

Head Coach Jerry Partridge: Missouri Western head coach Jerry Partridge is in his ninth season with the Griffons and has made his mark as one of the most successful coaches in the 36-year history of the football program. Partridge has a current 60-39 overall record and has led the Griffons to two postseason bowl games and MIAA co-champions in 2003. The Griffons won a school record nine games in 2003 under Partridge and claimed its first ever conference title in the sport of football. The Griffons have participated in two postseason bowl games under Partridge, picking up a win over Concordia-St. Paul 24-14 in the 2003 Mineral Water Bowl.

Griffons Notes: The Griffons compete in the MIAA which includes perennial NCAA Division II football power Pittsburg State. Other league teams include Northwest Missouri, Central Missouri, Missouri Southern, Truman, Emporia State, Southwest Baptist and Washburn. The Griffons two losses this season were in back to back games to Pittsburg State 48-30 and Northwest Missouri 31-21. Since those two losses, MWSU has ticked off five straight wins. The Griffons average 224.1 yards per game on the ground and 183.6 yards in the air. Offensively, Jeremiah White has carried the ball 209 times for 1359 yards and nine touchdowns this season. Michael Burton is 109 of 228 passing for 1569 yards and 11 touchdowns. His favorite target is Jarrett Brooks who has 32 catches for 523 yards and four touchdowns. Brandon Hale has 18 catches for 249 yards and four touchdowns.

## St. Cloud State to Induct Five into 2005 Athletic Hall of Fame

### **Becky Anderson Enebak, Gary Frericks, Reggie Perkins, Butch Raymond, and Rosie Silbaugh Stallman make up 24th induction class**

St. Cloud, Minn. – St. Cloud State University will induct five new members into the Athletic Hall of Fame on Saturday, October 29. The inductees include track and field star Becky Anderson Enebak; football, basketball and baseball standout Gary Frericks; All-American basketball player Reggie Perkins; former men's basketball coach Butch Raymond; and women's athletics pioneer in volleyball, basketball and softball Rosie Silbaugh Stallman. The group will be inducted in an on campus ceremony beginning at 10:30 a.m. Saturday.

#### 2005 SCSU Athletic Hall of Fame Inductees

Becky Anderson Enebak – Track and Field, 1987-1992

Becky Anderson had one of the most prolific careers of any athlete at SCSU in a career spanning from 1988 to 1992. As a freshman member of the track and field team in 1988, she won three North Central Conference titles, including an indoor long jump title, and the outdoor long jump and triple jump titles. She repeated as NCC champion in all three events in 1989. In 1990, she won the indoor triple jump and the outdoor long jump. In 1992, she came back to win the indoor and outdoor triple jump titles. She set the NCC outdoor long jump record in 1989. That adds up to ten NCC Championships, including four straight outdoor triple jump championships. Needless to say, she set school records in both the indoor and outdoor long and triple jumps, and all four records still stand in today's record book. The records are indoor long jump (18'11 3/4"), indoor triple jump (39'9"), outdoor long jump (19' 4 3/4"), and the outdoor triple jump (39' 6 1/4"). She was voted the 1989 NCC Outstanding Female Athlete at the outdoor championships. In 1990, she earned NCAA All-American honors with a sixth place finish in the triple jump at the NCAA Division II National Championships. In 1992, Anderson placed fourth in the long jump and fourth in the triple jump at the NCAA indoor national championships earning All-American honors. She made a return visit to the NCAA outdoor championships in 1992, placing sixth in both the long jump and triple jump, earning two more All-American honors. She left SCSU as a six-time track and field All-American. She was named the 1991 All-American Strength and Conditioning Woman Athlete of the Year for SCSU and 1992 SCSU Woman Track Athlete of the Year. Anderson also did well in the classroom as she earned NCC All-Academic team honors four times. She was an active member of the SCSU Vanguard program, was a 1992 SCSU Excellence in Leadership Award winner, and graduated Magna Cum Laude in 1992. Becky is a native of Barnesville, Minn., and currently resides with her family in Prior Lake, Minn.



Gary Frericks – Football, Basketball, Baseball, 1974-1979



Gary Frericks was a four-year starter and letterwinner on both the St. Cloud State football and baseball teams from 1974 to 1979. In addition, he played one season of basketball for the Huskies. He was a team captain, team MVP, and First Team All-Northern Intercollegiate Conference pick in football in 1977. A defensive back in football, Frericks still holds the SCSU single game record for tackles in a game. In a game against the University of Minnesota Duluth in 1977, Frericks tallied 25 tackles, including seven solo and 18 unassisted. That same year he led the team with five interceptions. In the spring of 1978, he was a team captain, team MVP and First Team All-NIC as an outfielder on the baseball team. During the 1976 and 1977 seasons, he led the team in hits with 25 and 40, respectively. He hit .305 during the 1976 season and .388 in 1977. He was a member of the 1976 and 1978 NIC Championship Baseball teams. Gary and his family reside in St. Joseph, Minn.

Reggie Perkins, Men's Basketball, 1984-88

Reggie Perkins was a member of the Husky basketball team during one of the most exciting, memorable runs in the history of the program. Perkins played basketball from 1984 to 1988. During that span, SCSU won an unprecedented three straight North Central conference championships in 1986, 1987, and 1988. In addition, SCSU won the 1985 and 1986 NCC Holiday Tournament. The Huskies also made three trips to the NCAA Division II North Central Region Tournament, advancing to the Region title game in 1985 and 1987. The Huskies lost in 1985, won the 1987 region championships and went on to host the quarterfinals of the NCAA Division II Elite Eight in 1987. Perkins was a two-time North Central Conference MVP and two-time All-North Central Conference team pick. He earned All-North Central Region MVP honors in 1987 and was a three-time pick to the North Central Region All-Tournament team. He was a 1988 NABC Division II Second Team All-American and a Street & Smith All-American in 1987 and 1988. He was named the 1987-88 Red Severson Award Winner, which is given to the Team MVP annually. He was also named to the 1986 NCC Holiday Tournament All-Tournament team. Perkins holds the school record for steals with 258 and ranks second on the all-time assist list with 597. He held the career assist record from 1988 to 1995. He ranks second all-time in field goals made and is fifth in all-time scoring with 1,582 career points. He currently holds the single season record for most steals with 74 set in 1987-88 and at one time held the single game assist record of 14 and the single season assist mark with 181 assists. During all four years of his career at SCSU, Perkins led the team in steals. He was also the team assist leader for three seasons and the team scoring leader his junior and senior seasons. He currently ranks third in the NCC in career steals with 160, fourth in career steals average with 2.29 per game, and fifth in career assists with 377. He became only the eighth player at the time to score 1,000 points in an NCC career and finished with 1,001 career points in league play. He was the

NCC champion in three statistical categories during his career. Perkins led the league in field goals made in 1987 and 1988, and was the league leader in steal average in 1985. The Huskies won 91 games during Perkins playing career and were ranked number one in the national poll for four consecutive weeks during the 1985-86 season. The Huskies were ranked as high as #3 during the 1986-87 season and were #2 in the final poll of the 1987-88 season. He was selected to the North Central Conference 25th Silver Anniversary Team. Following his collegiate career with the Huskies, Perkins was drafted by the Rochester Flyers of the CBA. He toured the world while playing for the World Famous Harlem Globetrotters from 1993 to 1996. He was an assistant SCSU basketball coach during the 1999-2000 season and was the men's golf coach for two seasons. Perkins is a native of Milwaukee, Wisc. He and his family reside in Apple Valley, Minn., where he is the owner of Perkins Player Development.

Butch Raymond, SCSU Men's Basketball Coach, 1984-1997



Butch Raymond marched the sideline at Halenbeck Hall for 13 seasons from 1984 to 1997 at the St. Cloud State University men's basketball coach. When he left to become an athletics administrator, he left behind an unprecedented era in Husky basketball, leading the Huskies to three straight North Central Conference titles. In his 13 seasons with the Huskies, Raymond compiled a 231-142 won/loss

record, the most wins of any coach in University history. He is also the longest tenured coach in SCSU basketball history, working the hard court for 13 seasons. He guided the Huskies to the triple crown of Husky basketball, winning North Central Conference titles in 1986, 1987 and 1988. In 25 years as a collegiate coach, he had compiled an impressive 449-300 record, which, at the time, ranked him among the top 20 active NCAA Division II coaches for most career wins. In 1984 Raymond, the 11th head coach in the history of the program, inherited a team, that had posted a 4-24 record during the previous season. In his first season he guided the Huskies to a 15-13 record. Four times he led the Huskies to 20-plus win seasons and the NCAA Regional tournament. In 1987, St. Cloud State advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Division II National Tournament. Raymond coached 18 players to All-Conference status and three of his players were named league MVP – Kevin Catron in 1986, Reggie Perkins in 1987 and 1988, and Joel McDonald in 1995. Raymond is a two-time North Central Conference Coach of the Year (1986 and 1987) and two-time Kodak District Coach of the Year. In 1994, Raymond received the Distinguished Alumni Award from the Minnesota State High School Athletic Directors Association. He is a member of the Minnesota State University, Mankato Hall of Fame. A native of Jasper, Minn., Raymond is currently the Commissioner of the Northern Sun Conference and resides with his wife in Eagan, Minn.

Rosie Silbaugh Stallman,  
Volleyball, Basketball, Softball, 1970-1973

Rosie Silbaugh was a pioneer in women's athletics at St. Cloud State as she was a member of some of the earliest teams to compete at the intercollegiate level. The first women's intercollegiate sport team to compete at SCSU was softball in the spring of 1969. Volleyball started competing in the fall of 1969 and basketball's first competition was held in the winter of 1971. Stallman captained the 1971 and 1973 volleyball teams. In 1973, the Huskies posted a 13-8 record and won the MWIAA State Tournament. In the four seasons that Silbaugh was a member of the volleyball team, SCSU posted a 42-27 record. She played basketball during the 1970-71 season and was a student assistant coach in the winter of 1973. Silbaugh played first base and was a starter on the softball team from 1971 to 1973. In 1973 she hit .429 for the Huskies. While a student, Silbaugh served as the student athlete representative at the MWIAA State Conferences and was the historian for the Women's Recreational Association from 1972 to 1974. Silbaugh has been a collegiate softball and volleyball coach at the University of Wisconsin-River Falls, Minnesota State, Mankato and Texas Wesleyan University. In addition, she has been the Athletics Director at Texas Wesleyan University and Eastern New Mexico State University. She is currently the Director of Education Outreach at the NCAA. Silbaugh is a native of Austin, Minn., and currently resides in Indianapolis, Ind.
