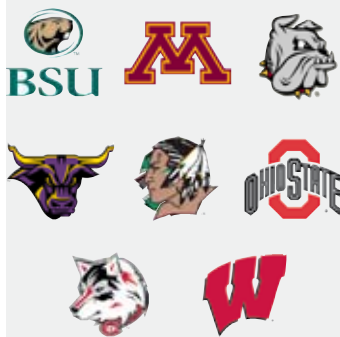

MADISON, Wis. – Goaltender Liana Bonanno backstopped Ohio State to an upset sweep of Providence, Oct. 3-4 in Providence, R.I., one of four sweeps turned in by Western Collegiate Hockey Association teams in a weekend which saw eight non-conference series. The Buckeyes' senior netminder made a total of 70 saves in the two victories with just three goals allowed to the Friars for a .959 saves percentage. She made 39 saves, just three shy of her career high, in a season-opening 2-1 victory last Friday. Bonanno then made 31 saves in the second game as the Buckeyes rallied for a 3-2 win to complete the sweep over Providence, just the second season-opening road sweep in Ohio State history.

road sweep at Niagara. The top-ranked Bulldogs spotted Niagara two goals in the first 12 minutes in the season opener last Friday (Oct. 3) before roaring back to take a 6-2 road victory and complete the sweep last Saturday (Oct. 4) with a 6-1 decision.

2008 NCAA runner-up and No. 2-ranked Wisconsin ran its early season winning streak to four by beating Syracuse 3-0 and 8-3 at the Kohl Center in Madison, Wis. Goalie Jessie Vetter stopped 11 shots and recorded her WCHA career record 27th career shutout in the series opener on Oct. 3 while freshman Brooke Ammerman scored four goals in the series finale on Oct. 4.

St. Cloud State went on the road and used two goals and four assists by Megan McCarthy to sweep Quinnipiac, 7-0 and 5-3, in a non-conference set.

Minnesota opened its season with a split at home against Robert Morris. Brianna McLaughlin stopped 63 of 65 shots as Robert Morris scored a 3-2 upset in the Friday, Oct. 3 game, but Gigi Marvin scored twice to lead the seventh-ranked Golden Gophers to a 7-1 victory in the series finale last Saturday.

North Dakota also ran into a hot goaltender, Genevieve Turgeon, who collected 46 saves to backstop host Maine to a 3-2 win over the visiting Fighting Sioux last Friday, but North Dakota erupted for a program-high seven goals on the road to take a 7-3 victory and gain a series split last Saturday. Melissa Jaques had a goal and three assists for the Fighting Sioux.

In other action last weekend, Kaylee Keys scored the game-winner as Bemidji State upset host Wayne State, 3-2, in the season opener in Detroit, but the Beavers fell 2-1 in overtime on Saturday while Minnesota State split two games with Connecticut in Mankato. The visiting Huskies took a 5-2 victory last Friday before Lisa Edman scored a goal and an assist and Minnesota State's Alli Altmann stopped 30 of 32 shots on goal in recording a 4-2 victory in the series finale.

The battle for the 2008-09 WCHA regular season championship opens this weekend for six teams. Each team will again consist of a 28-game schedule for each of the league's eight clubs, with each team playing the other seven four times - twice at home and

2008-09 WCHA PRE-SEASON COACHES' POLL

The University of Minnesota Duluth, which swept the national championship, the regular season championship and the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF title in a memorable streak last season, is the pre-season choice to repeat as Western Collegiate Hockey Association champions in 2008-09, according to league coaches.

This is the tenth season of WCHA women's play and league teams have won the national championship every season, including the inaugural

campaign of 1999-2000. The Bulldogs kept the WCHA's national title streak alive in 2007-08 when they won their fourth national title by defeating two-time defending champion Wisconsin, 4-0, on their home ice in Duluth in the NCAA title game. The victory capped a memorable season for UMD, which went 33-4-1 and also scored an overtime victory over Wisconsin to win the title of the newly-renamed WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF, the league playoff championships.

The Bulldogs received five first-place votes and a total of 47 points in the pre-season poll (the eight league coaches couldn't vote for their own team). They edged Minnesota, which grabbed two first-place votes, and Wisconsin, which had one first place vote, and had a total of 41 points. UMD, Wisconsin and Minnesota were ranked first through third in the national USA Today/US Hockey Magazine preseason college hockey poll as well.

Ohio State rounds out the top four followed by St. Cloud State, Minnesota State, North Dakota and Bemidji State.

For the second straight season, league-member coaches have picked Minnesota senior forward Gigi Marvin as the pre-season most valuable player. Four other players – Wisconsin forwards Meghan Duggan and Erika Lawler plus Minnesota Duluth goaltender Kim Martin, a Patty Kazmaier finalist last year, and teammate Haley Irwin, the forward who led the league in scoring with 60 points last season – also received votes for preseason MVP.

Minnesota Duluth's Pernilla Winberg, a forward from Sweden who was Martin's teammate on the silver medalist Swedish Olympic team in 2006, was voted the league's pre-season rookie of the year. She received half the votes from the eight coaches. Minnesota forward Jocelyne Lamoureux, Ohio State forward Natalie Spooner, and Wisconsin forward Carolyne Prevost also each received a vote.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – Minnesota Duluth remained in the top spot on this week's USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine Women's College Hockey Poll. The Bulldogs, who accumulated 17-of-19 first-place votes for 188 points, swept a non-conference series at Niagara over the weekend.

Aided by two non-conference wins against Syracuse, Wisconsin retained the No. 2 spot on the poll with 173 points and two first-place votes. Harvard (145), New Hampshire (127) and Mercyhurst College (103) round out the top five. Conference play begins tomorrow (October 8), as No. 4 University of New Hampshire takes on No. 10 Boston College.

A total of 15 teams received votes.

"Coming off our ninth consecutive national championship, and based on the continuing emergence of all of our member teams, we're confident the WCHA as a whole will be even more competitive from top to bottom this coming season."

The conference's post-season championship tournament will open the weekend of February 27-March 1 (Friday, Saturday and Sunday) with a first round, best-of-three series format at campus sites. The WCHA has introduced the shootout this season, after the option was installed recently by the rules committee. An NHL-style three-player shootout will be used to determine a winner for all WCHA games tied after regulation and five-minute overtime. For non-conference games involving WCHA home teams, the shootout procedure will be optional.

The NCAA rules and ice hockey committees have allowed conferences the ability to implement this tie-breaker protocol so that every regular-season league game will have a winner while preserving the integrity of the national rankings. Games decided by a shootout will still be considered ties for NCAA purposes so there will be no effect on NCAA records for the purposes of the Pairwise and determining the NCAA tournament field. Bonus points awarded will impact the conference standings only.

The WCHA has also approved the following point system for regular-season play; two (2) points for a win in regulation or overtime, one (1) point for each school if the game is tied at the conclusion of the five-minute overtime period, and one (1) point is awarded to the team who wins the shootout. Overtime will continue to be played similar to regulation time with five skaters for each team (penalties excepted).

WCHA WOMEN ADOPT SHOOTOUT FOR 2008-09 REGULAR SEASON PLAY LEAGUE TO USE NEW OPTION TO DETERMINE WINNER AFTER CONCLUSION OF STANDARD 5:00 OVERTIME PERIOD

MADISON, Wis. – The Western Collegiate Hockey Association has become the first NCAA Division 1 women's conference to officially re-introduce the shootout to college hockey, after the option was installed recently by the rules committee, Associate Commissioner Sara R. Martin announced today (August 28). The Central Collegiate Hockey Association also recently announced plans to use the shootout in its men's games. The Hockey East Association previously had installed a shootout in the mid-1990s, and is among the conferences considering re-instituting it, but has not yet.

A National Hockey League-style three-player shootout will be used to determine a winner for all WCHA regular season games still tied after regulation and the standard five-minute (5:00) overtime.

The NCAA Rules and Ice Hockey Committees have allowed conferences the ability to implement this tie-breaking protocol so that every regular-season league game will have a winner while preserving the integrity of the national rankings. Regular season games decided by a shootout will still be considered ties for NCAA purposes so there will be no effect on NCAA records for the purposes of the Pairwise and determining the national tournament field. Bonus points awarded will impact conference standings only.

"As a group, our head coaches were unanimous in adopting this exciting tie-breaking procedure to determine a winner for our regular season games," said Martin. "Over our first nine seasons as a Division 1 league, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association has continued to bring an impressive brand of women's hockey to the ice and collectively we think the adoption of the shootout will add an extra element of drama to our games for student-athletes, coaches, fans and media."

The WCHA has also approved the following point system for regular-season play; two (2) points for a win in regulation or overtime, one (1) point for each team if the game is still tied at the conclusion of the five-minute (5:00) overtime period, and one (1) additional point being awarded to the team who wins the shootout. Overtime will continue to be played similar to regulation time with five skaters and one goaltender for each team (penalties excepted).
