To determine if your budget (Estimated Cost of Attendance minus Budget Resources) **is balanced, enter on the Worksheet below your financial aid as listed on your Preliminary Award Letter.** This Worksheet is for your use only and *does not* need to be returned to the St. Cloud State University Financial Aid Office.
