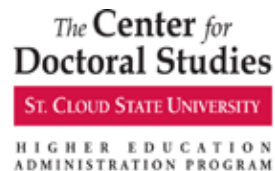

THE CHALLENGES OF AGENCY: EMPOWERING WOMEN TO LEAD

KEYNOTE SPEAKER PAMELA EDDY, PH.D.

Dr. Pamela Eddy is an associate professor of Higher Education at the prestigious College of William and Mary.

Dr. Eddy obtained her B.S. in Economics from Allegheny College, her M.S. from Cornell University in Resource Economics, and her Ph.D. in Higher, Adult, and Lifelong Education from Michigan State University.

Pamela Eddy is a nationally recognized expert on community college leadership, faculty work, and faculty development. She teaches courses in policy, higher education finance, organization and governance, community colleges, and women in education.

Dr. Eddy primarily researches career pathways, gendered approaches, and mid-level leadership. She has an extensive list of peer-reviewed publications on community colleges, faculty development, teaching and learning strategies, and gendered leadership. Another aspect of her research concerns partnerships and collaborations among colleges, universities, and community stakeholders - both in the US and in Ireland.

BREAKOUT SESSIONS

Breakout Session 1: Un-written Rules on Campus

This session explores the dynamics of hidden politics, and its influence and flux on college campuses. During this session, the unwritten rules will be addressed and deconstructed in regard to how they affect women at different administrative levels. This session proposes strategies for participants, including how women can work through and proactively channel the hidden politics for their own professional gain and success.

Breakout Session 2: Thriving on Campus

This session presents different scenarios about women in entry-, mid-, and senior-level positions. During this session, different issues and possible solutions will be discussed in terms of professional advancement and promotion. The session will present alternative approaches for “moving through the pipeline,” that are relevant to women working in different administrative positions, at all levels.

Breakout Session 3: Women as Others

This session will explore what it means for women to be underrepresented within an underrepresented group. The session will investigate the intersection of challenges faced by different groups of women (e.g. women of color, lesbians, women with disabilities, etc.) in higher education. Participants will discuss strategies that can be used to overcome the challenges. Additionally, the session will provide recommendations about how to foster an inclusive and supportive environment for “other” women in higher education.

Breakout Session 4: Beyond Work and Home

This breakout session focuses on ways to become involved and active outside career and/or home, to become socially engaged. The topics will range from volunteering within one’s own community, to participation on boards and committees, to seeking other professional and personal developmental opportunities suited to individual interests. The session will propose alternative opportunities for women based on their own personal and social interests.

Breakout Session 5: Imagining Leadership

What types of leadership positions are women attracted to as they enter higher education

administration? What can women do to become leaders in higher education? What are the new frontiers of leadership? What does women’s leadership look like in the twenty first century? These and other issues related to leadership in higher education will be discussed, actively engaging participants in the discussion.

Breakout Session 6: Mentoring and Sponsorship

Whether women are in an entry-level or mid-level position, mentorship and sponsorship are assets to personal and professional development. Mentorship could entail modeling the way for women in entry-level positions or it could entail skill and knowledge-base development accessible to women at mid- or senior- levels. For women in higher education, mentorship and sponsorship are crucial for support and development. This session will explore the different types of mentorship and sponsorship available to women as they ascend the administrative ladder.

PANEL PRESENTATION

Women in Higher Education Across the Globe

This panel is comprised of graduate students from both the master’s and doctoral programs in Higher Education Administration at St. Cloud State University. This international panel presentation will focus on the issues women face in higher education from a global standpoint. Issues of access, graduation rates, and representation of female faculty members and administrators will be identified using different country-cases. As the internationalization of higher education strengthens, the panelists will discuss and compare similarities and differences related to the plight of women across the globe.
