#### Mitchell Hall . . .



Where once seven Mitchell daughters grew up on the banks of the Mississippi, today more than 200 "Mitchell girls" study and live on the same site.

Home for today's students is a modern, brick, many-windowed structure – a study in contrasts to the rambling, red house of the gay nineties.

William Bell Mitchell, owner of the nineties dwelling and namesake of the present dormitory, served the Third State Normal school as resident director for a total of 24 years (1877-1901), reappointed by numerous governors and working with five different presidents. Always a champion of the local college, he has been described as "one of the major forces in shaping the development of the Normal School at St. Cloud."

Mitchell Hall, first unit in the new dormitory program on the State College campus, opened its doors this fall to 215 women. An addition, now being constructed, will bring the capacity of the dorm to 400 by the start of the 1959 school year.


Rooms in Mitchell are equipped with built-in wardrobes, dressers, desks, occasional chairs, Hollywood beds and light drapes. Each floor has a modern lounge, small kitchen unit and utility room.

In addition, the hall boasts a spacious lounge on first floor, an adjoining music room, director's suite, public rest rooms, a coat check room and offices.

The Snack Bar — which is open to the entire campus — is located on the ground floor where it is rapidly becoming an unofficial student center.

Work on Mitchell Hall was begun in the fall of 1956 and completed in May 1958 at a total cost of \$893,709. Furnishings totaled \$44,000, while the cost of the addition is estimated at \$552,897.

Architects were Frank W. Jackson and Associates of St. Cloud.

## Campus Laboratory School . . .



Visitors look back with nostalgia to their school days, while first grade veterans wish they were "still in kindergarten" — such is the lure of the new Campus Laboratory School.

The \$800,000 edifice, a long, low yellow-brick building with showcase size windows around the exterior, welcomed its first students this fall, even before its official completion.

Its opening forged another link in the history of the college "training program" which had its beginnings with the "model school" when the Third State Normal started in 1869. The original student body of 73 pupils soon multiplied to numbers necessitating a separate building—Riverview—in 1911, while today's modern facilities are used by nearly 300 youngsters.

"Functionalism" is the keynote of the new Laboratory School which is the net result of teacher-architect ideas. Chief features of the building are roominess, flexibility and brightness—color

predominates, from the student mosaic in the lobby to the mobile yellow and green desks and chairs of the classrooms. Rooms are large enough to hold a regular class plus student teachers and observers, office and workroom space.

The Lab School's kindergarten is a unit unto itself, with a separate entrance and plans underway for a fenced in playground and garden area.

Another feature of the school is its specially equipped cerebral palsy center – classroom, speech therapy facilities, restroom and physical therapy playroom – located in the junior high school wing.

In addition, the school contains a 182-seat auditorium, music center, cafeteria and library. In the planning stage are a psychoeducational clinic and physical education and allied arts facilities.

Construction of the Campus School began in July of 1957 and formal acceptance took place this month.

The building was designed by Architects Traynor and Hermanson of St. Cloud and Gausman and Moore of St. Paul.



## Science - Mathematics Building . . .

Though still in its "hole-in-the-ground" stage, the new Science and Mathematics Building is already a reality to those who see the campus in its 25-year perspective.

Work on the new site got underway in September, with completion scheduled in time for the opening of winter quarter, 1959. Cost of the completed project – furnished – is \$1,412,000.

The three-story structure will face Eighth Street and will occupy about one-half of the block between First and Second Avenues. A small greenhouse will front the building, while an auditorium, in a separate building, will be attached by a corridor in the rear.

First floor will contain the entire mathematics department as well as geology and botany sections. In addition there will be a staff room, as well as the suite of offices and lecture rooms which are included on every floor.

With the exception of one physics laboratory, second floor is to be devoted exclusively to the study of biology — with five labs, an "animal room" for live guests and a museum for mounted animals and other specimens. Plans call, too, for a dark room and small division library on this floor.

Three chemistry labs and three physics labs dominate the blueprints for third floor. There also will be five research labs on both second and third stories.

Traynor and Hermanson of St. Cloud are architects for the building.



## Dedication Speaker . . .

Dr. Roma Gans
Professor of Education
Teachers College
Columbia University
New York



A graduate of the class of 1916 – since become a national figure in the world of education – returns to her alma mater today to participate in dedicating the trio of new campus buildings.

Dr. Roma Gans, professor of education at Columbia Teachers college in New York, attended State in its era as Normal school—after which she taught and did supervisory work in schools in Minnesota (including St. Cloud Central Junior High and Tech), North Dakota, Wisconsin and Missouri. She also served as an editor for the Winston Book company in Philadelphia before beginning her career at Columbia where she had received her M.A. and Ph.D. degrees.

A native of St. Cloud, Dr. Gans is the author of numerous books and articles on topics in education. She is active, too, on radio and television and is a member of the Board of Directors of a number of associations including the Citizens Committee on Children of New York City, Inc.
