Sunday, June 19 – Juneteenth – is a day that celebrates the official end of slavery in the United States of America. Though the Emancipation Proclamation was signed into law on January 1, 1863 it took a group of enslaved people until June 19, 1865 in Galveston, Texas to finally receive word of their freedom. This summer a group of students took the opportunity to join President Wacker in Washington, DC for the 2nd annual President's Leadership Program and to celebrate Juneteenth. The group visited a number of national monuments and museums, including the National Museum of African American History and Culture.

I'd like to extend a heartfelt thank you to both AB and Sunny for their artistic talents in celebrating the first annual observance of the Juneteenth holiday. - **MULTICULTURAL ACADEMIC SUPPORT CENTER—Support services for students**  
**Centennial Hall 221, (320) 308-3952**

The Multicultural Academic Support Center provides direct academic services to students, helping to build the skills needed to successfully complete college while serving as a point of interaction between students, faculty and the community. Services available are a computer lab, tutoring for individuals or small groups, academic advising and counseling, assistance with class scheduling, listings of employment and internship opportunities, monitoring of academic progress, and a quiet study area.

- **ATHLETES FOR SUCCESS IN THE CLASSROOM—Academic services for student athletes**

The Athletes for Success in the Classroom program, working in partnership with the athletic department, provides academic support and a positive learning environment for student athletes at SCSU. Services provided include help with time management and study skills, tutoring, daily study tables, academic counseling and advising, assistance with course scheduling, and monitoring of academic progress.

- **ADVANCED PREPARATION PROGRAM—Summer scholarship program for new students**

The Advanced Preparation Program (APP) is a summer scholarship program open to new incoming first-year students who are admitted to SCSU. 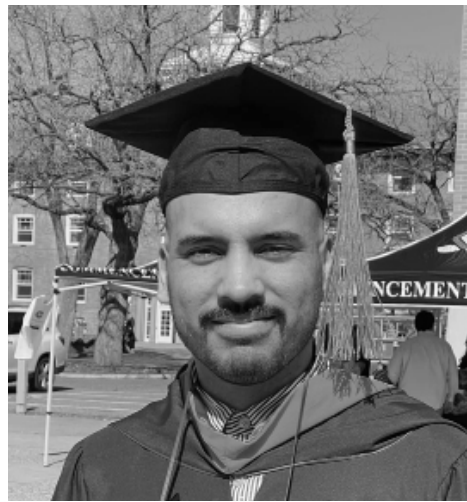

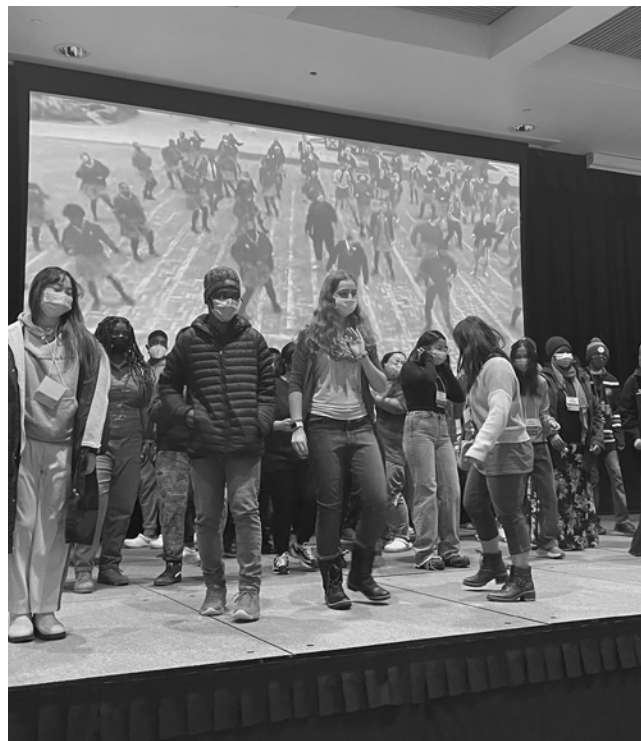
