EXPECTATIONS & ELIGIBILITY

Post Secondary Enrollment Options (PSEO) is a State of Minnesota, Department of Education program. Many of the policies and procedures you will hear during orientation and listed in this handbook are mandated by the State of Minnesota. There are also numerous policies listed that are established through St. Cloud State and interpreted by the University.

Many of the expectations and program policies are explained in detail on our website, in your handbook, and in your PSEO enrollment contract. A copy of this form is included in this booklet for your reference (p. 7).

Students should understand and agree to abide by the following policies and procedures:

Students must maintain a minimum CGPA of 2.0 to be eligible for continued enrollment in the program. Students who fall below the 2.0 CGPA will be suspended from the PSEO program for the duration of their high school career. In case of a suspension, students are responsible for making arrangements to return to their high school.



THE ST. CLOUD STATE PSEO PROGRAM COVERS:

- Tuition and course related fees for applicable courses; most special course fees
- Consumable supplies such as paint, film, lab materials and other consumable supplies
- Textbooks

All books and materials purchased through the PSEO program are property of St. Cloud State University. You must return your books to the on-campus Husky Bookstore during buy-back week during finals. Failure to return books during that time may result in charges for all outstanding materials. You must identify yourself as a PSEO student and you are not eligible for cash refunds.

In some cases, the bookstore will no longer be accepting back your textbooks or materials. In those cases, please deliver your remaining items to the Office of Admissions (AS 115).

Students who drop or withdraw from a course must immediately return textbooks and supplies received from the bookstore.

OTHER ITEMS THAT ARE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE PSEO STUDENT:

- Non-consumable supplies such as calculators, athletic/music uniforms, instrument rentals
- Basic school supplies (i.e. pens, paper, folders, notebooks, etc.)
- Housing/Meal Plan costs
- Parking costs
- Extra/Co-Curricular Activities
- Special course fees for private music lessons

As a high school student seeking to enroll in the University, it is imperative students understand the expectations of college students.

PSEO STUDENTS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR:

- Following the St. Cloud State Student Code of Conduct
- Attending class regularly
- Checking your St. Cloud State HuskyNet email account
- Asking questions and seeking assistance
- Finding study groups or tutors
- Keeping in touch with your high school responsibilities, guidance counselor and friends

2010-11 PSEO PROGRAM STUDENT AGREEMENT FORM

As a St. Cloud State University Post Secondary Enrollment Options (PSEO) student I understand that there are policies and expectations to which I must adhere in order to remain eligible for the program, including the St. Cloud State Code of Conduct and the St. Cloud State PSEO program policies:

- ✓ I understand that I am responsible for reading, understanding, and following all the guidelines and procedures listed in the PSEO student handbook and my signed student agreement form (contract), kept on file in the Office of Admissions.
- ✓ I understand that I am responsible for my own attendance in my courses and my personal academic progress. I will take initiative to ask questions and seek assistance if needed.
- ✓ I understand and agree that I must maintain a cumulative St. Cloud State GPA of 2.0 to continue my participation in the program. Failure to do so will result in my immediate and permanent suspension from the PSEO program at St. Cloud State University. I understand that I must make my own arrangements to return to my high school for subsequent terms.
- ✓ I understand that I may register for 100 and 200 level courses. If I enroll in upper-division courses, I will secure permission from the faculty member prior to registration. I understand that I must cover the tuition, fees, and textbooks of any course I take below the 100 level, as preparatory courses are not covered by the program.
- ✓ I understand the official form of communication for St. Cloud State University and the PSEO program is HuskyNet e-mail. I agree to activate my HuskyNet, notify the Office of Admissions of this e-mail address, and check the account regularly.
- ✓ I understand that I must submit my Notice of Student Registration Form (3-part form) each semester prior to registration. I understand that if I do not submit the form that I may be responsible for the charges or that my classes may be dropped.
- ✓ I understand that all books charged to and/or reimbursed by St. Cloud State are property of St. Cloud State University. I agree to return all books/materials charged to and/or reimbursed by St. Cloud State to the Husky bookstore (located in Centennial Hall) during finals week. I understand I must pay replacement costs for all books not returned to the Husky Bookstore in a timely manner.
- ✓ I understand that if I wish to continue my education at St. Cloud State after high school graduation I must apply using the Undergraduate Application for Admission and submit an official high school transcript following the postcard deadlines for admission, scholarships, financial aid and on-campus housing. I may request an application fee waiver; it is not automatic.
- ✓ I understand that I must submit a completed application for admission by December 15th (including ACT scores) in order to receive all benefits available to PSEO students who continue their education at St. Cloud State University, including scholarships. Students in good standing having earned 15+ St. Cloud State credits through on-campus courses prior to the spring term of their senior year may be eligible for early orientation and registration opportunities.
- ✓ I understand that as a PSEO student I must meet the same conduct and academic expectations of a degree-seeking University student; status as a PSEO student is not an excuse for poor academic performance or conduct issues.
- ✓ I authorize St. Cloud State University to inform my parent/guardian (if under 18) and my high school of my semester enrollment and academic performance.

Your St. Cloud State Campus Card serves as an official ID, and can hold important accounts:

1. Campus Cash is a prepaid, stored-value account that is the convenient, cashless way to pay on campus. You can use Campus Cash at the University Bookstore, the Market Food Court, Residence hall laundry machines, Student Printing and Vending machines around campus.
2. Student Print Account may be used at any St. Cloud State computer lab to print documents. Each term you are enrolled, you will receive \$8 in this account. Once funds are depleted, it will automatically draw from your Campus Cash account.
3. Meal Plan/Munch Money is offered through the Campus Dining service. See www.scsudining.com for more information, or read through the brochure when you receive your Campus Card.

PARKING PERMITS

Parking permits are required in all St. Cloud State University parking lots. Permits for the entire academic year may be purchased through the Public Safety Department. You will need to provide the make and model of your car along with the license plate number. Payment may be made by check, Visa, MasterCard, Discover, or American Express. The Public Safety Department is located in the 4th Avenue Parking Ramp. You may also download a parking permit application from the Public Safety website.

Due to limited parking near the residence halls, most students living on campus will park in Q lot. Commuting students will park in K lot. Shuttle bus service is available from both lots to the heart of the St. Cloud State campus at frequent intervals.

Options for hourly parking include the 4th Avenue Parking Ramp (located just north of the Miller Learning Resources Center), the South Pay Lot (south of the Education Building) and Miller Pay Lot (adjacent to the Miller Learning Resource Center). The ramp accepts Campus Card Cash, credit cards, debit cards and cash. The pay lots accept Campus Card Cash or cash. The hourly fee for both the ramp and the pay lots is \$1.00/per hour. Miller Pay Lot is limited to one hour parking.

IMMUNIZATION FORM

NOTE: Students who graduated from a Minnesota high school in 1997 or later are exempt from this requirement.

All other students must show proof of immunity to measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria and tetanus during their first semester at St. Cloud State.

HUSKYNET

HuskyNet, short for Husky Network, is your access to technology services at St. Cloud State. Through the use of your HuskyNetID (username), you will have access to an e-mail account, network file space and web space, and the ability to perform coursework activities and locate technology-related resources. If you need to activate your HuskyNetID, you can do so by clicking on “Activate MY HuskyNetID” (You’ll need the St. Cloud State ID# located on your Campus Card and your PIN).

To access your e-mail go to the HuskyNet website and click on “E-mail”.

Important: HuskyNet e-mail is an official form of communication at St. Cloud State. All students are required to activate their HuskyNetID, and you should check your HuskyNet account regularly to be sure you don't miss important announcements from St. Cloud State offices and instructors.

BOOKS

After registration, bring your St. Cloud State ID and a copy of your semester schedule to the on-campus Husky Bookstore (Centennial Hall). Identify yourself as a PSEO student, and staff will assist with gathering your required materials/texts. Your items will be entered into the system, and you will sign for your books.

Occasionally, you will need to purchase a textbook or required course item that is not available in the bookstore or is only available online/off-campus. In these cases, you will be required to purchase the item(s) and complete a reimbursement from through the Office of Admissions (AS 115). Your refund will be processed in approximately 4 – 8 weeks and you will receive a check sent to your home address. We suggest maintaining a copy of your reimbursement submission should you have any questions or issues.

RESPECT & RESPONSIBILITY WORKSHOP

At St. Cloud State University we are taking one of the country's most pro-active stances to create a community that is free of oppressive interactions and relationships. We want all of our students to enjoy a healthy and engaging experience during their time at our university.

To help foster this environment, St. Cloud State requires all new degree-seeking students to participate in education about sexual violence prevention and about the responsibilities of being part of a diverse and welcoming community. The educational programs are entitled Respect and Responsibility.

You will be sent specific instructions on how to complete these programs to your HuskyNet e-mail. **If you do not complete this requirement, you will not be able to register for the following semester's classes, so it is very important that you activate your HuskyNet e-mail account right away and check it regularly.** The messages will come from the University Women's Center and the Department of Student Life and Development. Watch for these messages the month before school begins.

Your commitment to this program, and others like it, will result in a welcoming and productive environment for all students. It will also prepare you for success in the work world. It is our collective responsibility to understand these issues and work together to create a respectful climate that allows all of our students to fully develop their personal goals while achieving academic success.

For PSEO students, the sexual violence prevention program is required during your first semester of enrollment. The other component is optional for PSEO students, but for those students who later intend to enroll as degree-seeking students, it will be required at that time.

ACADEMICS

WHICH COURSES SHOULD I TAKE?

PSEO students should work with their high school to determine which courses they need to register for through PSEO. Frequently these courses include English and social studies courses. Some students register for their required courses through their high school and take advantage of high school electives through the PSEO program. Some courses are more difficult to get during fall semester as they are also in high demand with our degree-seeking students (composition courses, science lab courses, etc.).

HOW MANY CLASSES CAN I TAKE?

PSEO students can enroll in 1 – 17 credits per term at St. Cloud State. Students registering part-time at St. Cloud State may not exceed full time status (as determined by their high school) each term.

WHO IS MY ADVISOR?

St. Cloud State PSEO students must still rely on their high school/home school guidance counselors to ensure adequate progress towards high school graduation. Each high school will determine the maximum course load per semester, how courses transfer to the high school for credit, and which courses are acceptable choices to fulfilling high school course requirements. St. Cloud State admissions staff can assist with selecting courses applicable to particular majors or those planning to enroll at St. Cloud State after high school.

ST. CLOUD STATE LIBERAL EDUCATION PROGRAM

We strongly encourage students to consider following the St. Cloud State Liberal Education Program. In following this 10 goal area general education curriculum, students will begin making progress towards completion of general education requirements, as well as a smooth transfer if needed.

LIBERAL EDUCATION PROGRAM

The St. Cloud State Liberal Education Program is the official general education program at St. Cloud State. Completion of the St. Cloud State Liberal Education Program is a component of a baccalaureate degree and a requirement for graduation. The courses listed here may change.

The list will be updated periodically. Check with the Office of Academic Affairs or <http://bulletin.stcloudstate.edu/ugb/gened.asp> for the current list.

- Students must complete all ten goals and achieve a total of at least 40 credits.
- Number superscripts above the course indicate another goal to which the course may be applied.
- Students must complete 3 diversity courses which are **bold & underlined**. The Diversity courses must come from three different rubrics or academic areas.

TRANSFER STUDENTS

St. Cloud State also accepts the completed Minnesota Transfer Curriculum (MTC) as fulfilling the St. Cloud State Liberal Education Program, including Racial Issues. Students are also responsible for PESS 122, a university requirement for graduation.

Students with a partially completed MTC are not required to repeat any goals they have already fulfilled at another Minnesota State College or University, and will be allowed to select from the course list above to complete the ten MTC goals. Students are still responsible for Racial Issues and PESS 122, university requirements for graduation.

TRANSFERRING PSEO CREDITS

Students who have identified the college/university they intend to enroll in following high school graduation should remain in contact with that campus' Admissions Office for course transferability. Students may also utilize the u.select program to determine course transferability online at: <https://mn.transfer.org/cas/index.jsp>

300/400 LEVEL COURSES

Students seeking to enroll in an upper level course must first seek permission from the instructor. If granted, the instructor will enter an override for the student, allowing for their registration.

ACCESS CODE

PSEO students will not need access codes for semester course registration.

ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE STANDARDS

It is important for you to keep academic success in mind from the very beginning of your college career. The university sets minimum standards for satisfactory academic progress. Students must maintain at least a 2.0 CGPA and a cumulative percentage of credits completed of approximately 67% to be in good academic standing. Future eligibility for admission and financial aid can also be affected if students do not maintain satisfactory academic progress.

BILLS/FEE PAYMENTS

Your bill will ONLY be available at students' e-Services accounts. Click on Bills & Payments to make a payment. This will apply to room/board costs, private instrument rentals, parking and university fines and for courses that are not covered by the PSEO program.

CO-REQUISITES

Co-requisites are courses that must be taken during the same semester. Some courses may require a co-requisite class section. For example, some courses require both a lecture and lab component.

COURSE LOAD

PSEO students may enroll in 1 – 17 St. Cloud State credits per term. Students enrolling full time generally register for 12 – 15 credits. Part time students can enroll in any number of St. Cloud State credits, permitting their combined high school and PSEO enrollment does not exceed full time status. This load is determined by each individual high school.

CREDIT LOAD

An undergraduate student enrolled for 12 credits or more is considered a full-time student for academic purposes. The maximum allowable load for PSEO students per term is 17 credits.

DEAN'S LIST

PSEO students are eligible for the Dean's List. St. Cloud State official policy states: *"The University recognizes outstanding scholastic achievement by awarding certificates each semester, with the exception of summer semester, to students who earn a grade point average of 3.75 or better. A student must complete at least nine credits of ABCDF-graded courses to be eligible for the award."*

DROP

Dropping a course by the deadline means the course is removed from your class schedule, you are not charged for the course, and the course does not appear on your transcript. PSEO students have an additional week to 'drop' a course. PSEO students must drop a course within the first two weeks of the term to avoid it's presence on their transcript. Drops must be completed through the online e-Services system. Drop dates for each term are emailed to PSEO students.
Fall 2010 – September 3
Spring 2011 – January 21

EARNED CREDIT HOUR REQUIREMENT

A student registering for the next semester must have completed the required number of semester credits at the time of registration to be eligible to register for the course. Examples include:

ACCT 291, 292	12 credits

FEDERAL EDUCATION AND PRIVACY RIGHTS ACT (FERPA)

Once you turn 18 or enroll at a university, your privacy rights transfer to you. FERPA prohibits schools from providing non-directory information to anyone other than you (the student), including parents and family members. As part of your PSEO program contract, you authorize the Admissions Office to share your term grades and academic progress with your high school as well as your parents/guardians.

FIELD TRIPS

PSEO students under the age of 18 are not allowed to participate in out-of-state field trips unless accompanied by a parent/guardian. Additionally, the fees associated with the trip must be paid by the student. Students participating in a St. Cloud State course-sanctioned field trip must complete a waiver through the Office of Admissions.

GRADES

Tracking college grades is very different from high school. Professors may not have running grade totals, so it is the student's responsibility to understand the grading for each course, based upon their syllabi. Remember that the grades you earn through PSEO become a permanent part of your academic record, showing on your high school transcript and your college transcript. This information is frequently requested for scholarship consideration, university admission and with future job searches.

At the end of each semester, grades will be posted online. Students have access to view grades at that time. The Office of Admissions will print and send transcript reports to individual high school/home schools on behalf of the student. However, this can be a lengthy process. We encourage students to work with their high schools to ensure grades are received in an appropriate timeframe.

GRADING SYSTEM

The following marks are used in reporting the achievement of students at this institution: A (excellent), B (very good), C (average), and D, F, FW and FN. A grade of FW or FN is a failure for non-attendance and affects the student's GPA in the same way as a grade of F.

HOLDS ON COURSES

If you try to register and the system indicates you have a hold on your registration, you must contact the office that placed the hold to make necessary arrangements before you can register for courses. A hold is placed on registration for students who have any outstanding responsibilities to the University. These responsibilities can include unresolved debts (including library and parking fines), failure to comply with certain admissions requirements or academic regulations or violations of conduct codes or other University rules.

HUSKYNET

HuskyNet email is the official communication channel for sending students University-related notification and information. All students are required to activate their HuskyNet and check their account regularly to ensure they receive important messages from St. Cloud State. Faculty members and university offices use HuskyNet to send students course information, updates and program deadlines.

LATE WITHDRAWAL POLICY

A late withdrawal is a request to withdraw from a class after the published withdrawal deadline and is considered only for extenuating circumstances. These requests require approval from the college offering the course or the Office of Academic Affairs.

LIBRARY

Learning Resources & Technology Services (LR&TS), located in the James W. Miller Learning Resources Center serves all disciplines of the university. The LR&TS collection consists of more than 2.767 million print and non-print items for the academic community, with more than 576,000 books. The electronic catalog is available online and numerous databases are also available. St. Cloud State is a member of the MINITEX network system of Minnesota, which provides access to all major library collections. Materials from other libraries can be obtained through Interlibrary Loan at no cost to the user.

More than 750 study tables, 16 student study rooms, and 474 lounge seats populate the library.

MAJOR STUDENTS ONLY

To enroll in courses listed as MAJOR STUDENTS ONLY, you must be officially admitted to a major in that department. PSEO students are ineligible to declare majors, and are ineligible for these courses.

MATHEMATICS PLACEMENT TEST

A recent satisfactory ACT math sub-score, a recent sufficient score on a mathematics placement test, or prerequisite coursework is required for enrollment in MATH 072, 112, 113, 115, 171, 193, 196, 211, 221, and STAT 193, 219, 229, 319. For more information, sample questions and placement advice, visit www.stcloudstate.edu/mathplacement and www.stcloudstate.edu/placementtesting

CAUTION: Materials should be provided directly to the Department of Mathematics because materials sent only to the Office of Records & Registration may not be evaluated to provide student exemption.

NON-ATTENDANCE

If you register for a class(es) and do not attend/participate or stop attending/participating without officially dropping or withdrawing, you may be held responsible for payment and you will receive a failing grade for the class(es).

PERMISSION REQUIRED COURSES

Before registering for classes listed as permission required, students must ask the academic department for pre-authorization. In most departments a student should contact the department support person. After that person has processed the pre-authorization request, students must then register for the class using the online registration system.

PLACEMENT TESTING

A number of St. Cloud State courses require appropriate placement prior to enrollment. Courses include English, mathematics and statistics. Students may fulfill placement testing requirements by submitting ACT or SAT scores with minimum sub-scores. Accuplacer scores may also fulfill these requirements.

Students seeking to enroll in some biology or chemistry courses may need departmental placement testing. Students should contact those departments directly for testing schedules.

PRE-REQUISITES

Check the undergraduate or graduate bulletin to see if a class has a pre-requisite. Students will be unable to register for courses in which they do not meet the pre-requisites.

RESTRICTED COURSES

MATH 070/072: Students seeking to enroll in either course must pay for all tuition, fees and textbooks on their own, as these courses are considered preparatory in nature and are not offered for college credit. Independent study courses, internship courses, field experiences and clinical experiences are not covered under the PSEO program.

STUDENT RECORDS AND DIRECTORY INFORMATION

The following information has been defined as directory information at St. Cloud State:

- Date of birth
- Class status
- Participation in officially recognized activities
- Dates of attendance

This information may be released without your authorization, unless you restrict its release. You may restrict release of your directory information by completing a Request for Non-Disclosure Form available at www.stcloudstate.edu/registrar or from the Office of Records & Registration in AS 118.

Students who opt to restrict the release of address and phone number information will not appear in the Campus Director (if submitted prior to September 15), on most mailing lists used by St. Cloud State student organizations, on mailing lists obtained from St. Cloud State by non-university groups, or in the campus Email white pages.

STUDY ABROAD PROGRAMS

PSEO students are ineligible for study abroad programs. They can, however, plan a future study abroad program with the assistance of advisors in the Center for International Studies.

SUMMER COURSES

PSEO students seeking to enroll in summer courses must cover all associated tuition, fees and textbooks costs on their own. Students finishing their junior year must apply as a Special Student to be eligible for summer courses. Students finishing their senior year may apply as Special Students, or officially be admitted into the University for summer term depending upon their goals. Seniors may be eligible for financial aid programs as well.

TRANSFERRING ST. CLOUD STATE CREDITS

For students who intend to enroll at another college/university after their PSEO experience, we recommend making contact with that university's admission office. Work with their staff to determine appropriate St. Cloud State courses for transfer. For students planning to enroll at a MnSCU campus, we encourage you to follow the St. Cloud State Liberal Education Program to remain consistent with the Minnesota Transfer Curriculum. Students will also need to send an official transcript to the campus. MnSCU campuses have access to St. Cloud State transcripts for free.

WITHDRAW

A course withdrawn after the drop/add period and before the withdrawal deadline. All university students have the ability to withdraw from a course. A withdrawal is denoted on your transcript as a "W" but is not calculated into your GPA. Your school will be charged for a class that you withdraw from and you may be financially responsible. While a "W" does not factor into a GPA, it does factor into your Satisfactory Academic Progress report. Be sure to work closely with your guidance counselor before withdrawing from a course.

CLASS MEETING TIMES

Courses that meet other than for the full term or the first session or second session are listed with the Begin and End Dates in the course schedule.

IF A COURSE YOU WANT IS FULL...

Remain diligent in checking the online registration system for open seats. Students can make changes to their schedules through several days into the semester, so an opening could occur at any time during that period.

Check with the department that offers the course to see if they keep a waiting list of students wanting to register for a particular course. Keep in mind that not all departments utilize waiting lists so you will need to inquire at each department to find out their policy.

Try to contact the professor in person, by stopping by his or her office, by phone, or by email to politely inquire whether he or she anticipates being able to allow any additional students into the class. This may not be possible, but the professor may also be able to offer other suggestions.

ONLINE COURSES

HOW DO I REGISTER FOR AN ONLINE COURSE?

Log onto the Continuing Studies website (www.stcloudstate.edu/continuingstudies) and click on Schedules & Registration. Click on SCSU Online Course Schedule.

HOW DO I RECEIVE THE COURSE CODE FOR THE COURSE I WANT TO REGISTER FOR?

The course ID will be listed on the SCSU Online Course Schedule. If the course requires special permission to register, you must click on Permission Required and complete the Permission to Register Form. This form is available during the registration period. Within two to three business days you will receive a confirmation of your request and information on how to register.

HOW DO I ACCESS MY COURSE INFORMATION FOR THE SCUS ONLINE COURSES?

Course materials and syllabi are available in Desire2Learn (D2L) approximately 10 days prior to the start of the semester. You may find that not all of your online course materials are available at the same time; if that is the case, check back frequently, as courses are updated each day.

WHAT IS D2L?

Your online course can be accessed through a program called Desire2Learn (D2L). You do not need any special software for this, only a computer and Internet browser. The majority of your course materials, syllabi, and online discussions or testing (required by some classes) will be housed in D2L. Once you have officially registered for the course and have activated your HuskyNet account, you will be able to enter D2L and access your syllabi.

HOW DO I ACCESS D2L?

To enter D2L, go to the following site: <http://husky.net.stcloudstate.edu/d2l>
 Enter your HuskyNet ID and password. You will see the page "My D2L" with your name. The online courses that you have registered for will be listed under the current semester heading. Click on the underlined link to enter the course.

DO I NEED TO GET BOOKS FOR MY COURSE?

Yes, you will need to gather books for your online course. It is the student's responsibility to gather their own course materials. Books are not mailed to you.

ST. CLOUD STATE STUDENT ID

Students who have been admitted into PSEO and registered for classes may then seek their St. Cloud State ID card. Students must wait 24 hours after registration before securing their card from the Campus Card Office (Atwood Memorial Center). Please bring your St. Cloud State ID number and an official state ID (driver's license, etc.) and let the staff know you are a new student. Your first ID is free, but you will be charged for subsequent cards.

Your ID will serve as your library card, Metro Bus pass, print card, and 'ticket' to campus athletic events and social activities. Students may elect to add cash value to their card, utilizing it similar to a campus debit card. Students also have the opportunity to establish a TCF bank account on campus and use their St. Cloud State ID as an ATM card.

PARKING

All parking lots and areas are enforced year round. Campus parking permits can be purchased through the Public Safety Office. You will need to provide the make and model of your car along with the license plate number. • Pay Parking Lots

The following pay lots are located on the campus of St. Cloud State and the fee is \$1/hour for all lots. South Pay Lot is located near the College of Education and the ECC. Husky Pay Lot is located near the Campus Recreation Center and has a two hour limit. Miller Pay Lot is adjacent to the Miller Center and is limited to one hour parking.

• 4th Avenue Parking Ramp

The Ramp is located at 516 Fourth Ave South, just north of the James W. Miller Learning Resources Center. Fully-automated, the ramp accepts Campus Cash, credit cards, debit cards and cash. The hourly rate is \$1/hour, with an \$8/day maximum which provides parking for a period of up to 24 hours.

• City Street Parking

If parking on a city street, please make certain that a city parking permit is not required. Most streets around our campus do require a city parking permit and this is indicated on the city's signage. STUDENT HOUSING

Those considering off-campus housing should understand that those arrangements are not coordinated nor controlled by the University.

Students who live on campus must abide by the policies set forth by the Office of Residential Life and the St. Cloud State Student Code of Conduct. This includes making all payments for your room and board fees, plus any additional incurred expenses. Arrangements for payments must be made prior to subsequent semester course registration and transcript release.

Public Safety

Star Alert

Star Alert, a free St. Cloud State emergency notification system, makes it possible for students to receive notice by cell phone and/or e-mail of campus-related emergencies that threaten life safety or severely impact campus operations.

Students can register for this notification service at the website listed below. In an emergency, Star Alert will send a text message to the cell number(s) and/or e-mail address(es) you provide. Notifications identified as “Star Alert” messages will note the nature of the emergency, what action, if any, you are to take, and where to find more information. Star Alert also will let you know if campus is closed or if classes are delayed or cancelled.

Star Alert notification is in addition to any message the University sends to all HuskyNet e-mail addresses when there is an emergency. Depending on the nature and severity of the emergency, other mechanisms may include alerts on the St. Cloud State Web site and voicemail messages on campus phones.

Students may use Health Services even if they do not have medical insurance; however, they are then individually responsible for any charges.

Parking Permits

Parking permits are required in all St. Cloud State University parking lots. Permits for the entire academic year may be purchased through the Public Safety Department. You will need to provide the make and model of your car along with the license plate number. Payment may be made by check, Visa, MasterCard, Discover, or American Express. You may also download a parking permit application from the Public Safety website.

Due to limited parking near the residence halls, most students living on campus will park in Q Lot. Commuting students will park in K Lot. Shuttle bus service is available from both lots to the heart of the St. Cloud State campus at frequent intervals.

Options for hourly parking include the 4th Avenue Parking Ramp (located just north of the Miller Learning Resources Center), the South Pay Lot (south of the Education Building) and Miller Pay Lot (adjacent to the Miller Learning Resource Center). The ramp accepts Campus Card Cash, credit cards, debit cards and cash. The pay lots accept Campus Card Cash or cash. The hourly fee for both the ramp and the pay lots is \$1.00 per hour. • Electronic Classrooms

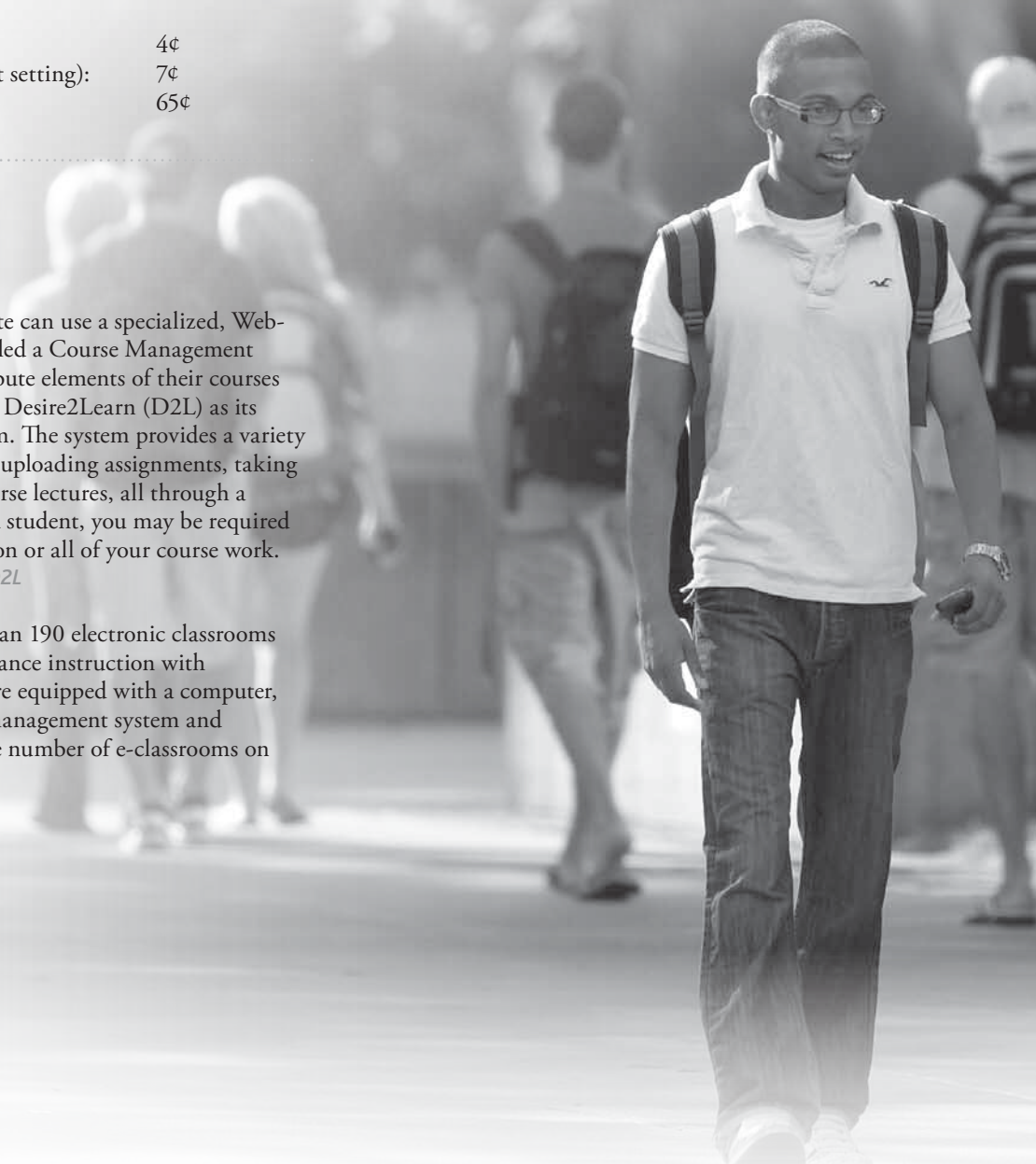

Apply for admission by submitting your degree-seeking application, official high school transcript, ACT/SAT scores, and request an application fee waiver from the Office of Admissions. Students admitted by **December 15** will be automatically considered for merit-based Admissions Scholarships. Please note applications received on the 15th may not be included, so we encourage early application.

FINANCIAL AID/SCHOLARSHIPS

Students who are admitted for Fall 2011 by December 15 will be automatically considered for St. Cloud State merit based scholarships. We encourage early application to ensure your application is processed prior to the deadline.

ADMITTED STUDENT DAYS

PROVIDING SUPPORT FOR YOUR COLLEGE STUDENT

As your student prepares for college, your parent-child and family member relationships are in transition to a new stage. This page offers discussion topics to keep in mind as you navigate through this new experience with your college student.

DEFINING ROLES IN ACADEMIC ADVISING

ACADEMIC ADVISOR ROLE

Academic advisors are well informed about the institution's resources available to students. They do more than help students register for classes. The academic advisor assists students in the development of meaningful educational plans that are compatible with personal and/or career goals and instill a desire for lifelong learning.

STUDENT ROLE

Student responsibility is the key to a successful and meaningful college experience. Students bear the ultimate responsibility for their personal and academic progress. Students:

- Are responsible for learning and understanding;
- Monitor their own academic progress;
- Know the degree requirements;
- Communicate with the advisor regarding issues and/or concerns about academics or student life;
- Attend classes;
- Manage time for class preparation;
- Become familiar with university resources.

PARENT / FAMILY ROLE

Parents and family members:

- Are available to support and encourage;
- Maintain regular contact;
- Make a plan about how you and your student will communicate – when and how often;
- Discuss academic expectations, including the importance of regular class attendance and study times;
- Ask about classes, not just to 'check-up', but also to express interest in what they are learning;
- Encourage their students to work towards establishing a good mix for academic work, social life, possible employment, and involvement in valuable co-curricular activities;
- Offer advice when appropriate;
- Allow students to make mistakes in this safe environment. Be a coach rather than a problem solver;
- Encourage students to do things they can do for themselves. It is vital that students learn to deal with issues that concern them. For example, encourage your student to contact his or her advisor. Good advising requires face-to-face communication between student and advisor. Learning how to seek assistance is an important part of learning to succeed.

Students of today look up to their parents as mentors and role models. One of the most important and valuable things parents can offer their college students is support and encouragement. Positive reinforcement from parents is crucial to their students' college success. It is important that advisors,



students, and parents support each other in helping students make responsible decisions that will shape their future. Young college students are in the process of realizing their autonomy. As parents, it is important to let your children do things for themselves. This fosters personal development and allows students to emerge as capable adults. Trust the judgment and wisdom of the advisor. Allow your children to experience and appreciate the exciting challenges college life can bring.

The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, commonly referred to as FERPA, is a federal law that protects the privacy of student educational records. This federal law prohibits the university to share student records, including grades, with anyone but the student. Your student can choose to share information, such as grades, with you. It is important to discuss with your student expectations about sharing this information. Clarify in advance how you will handle this situation.

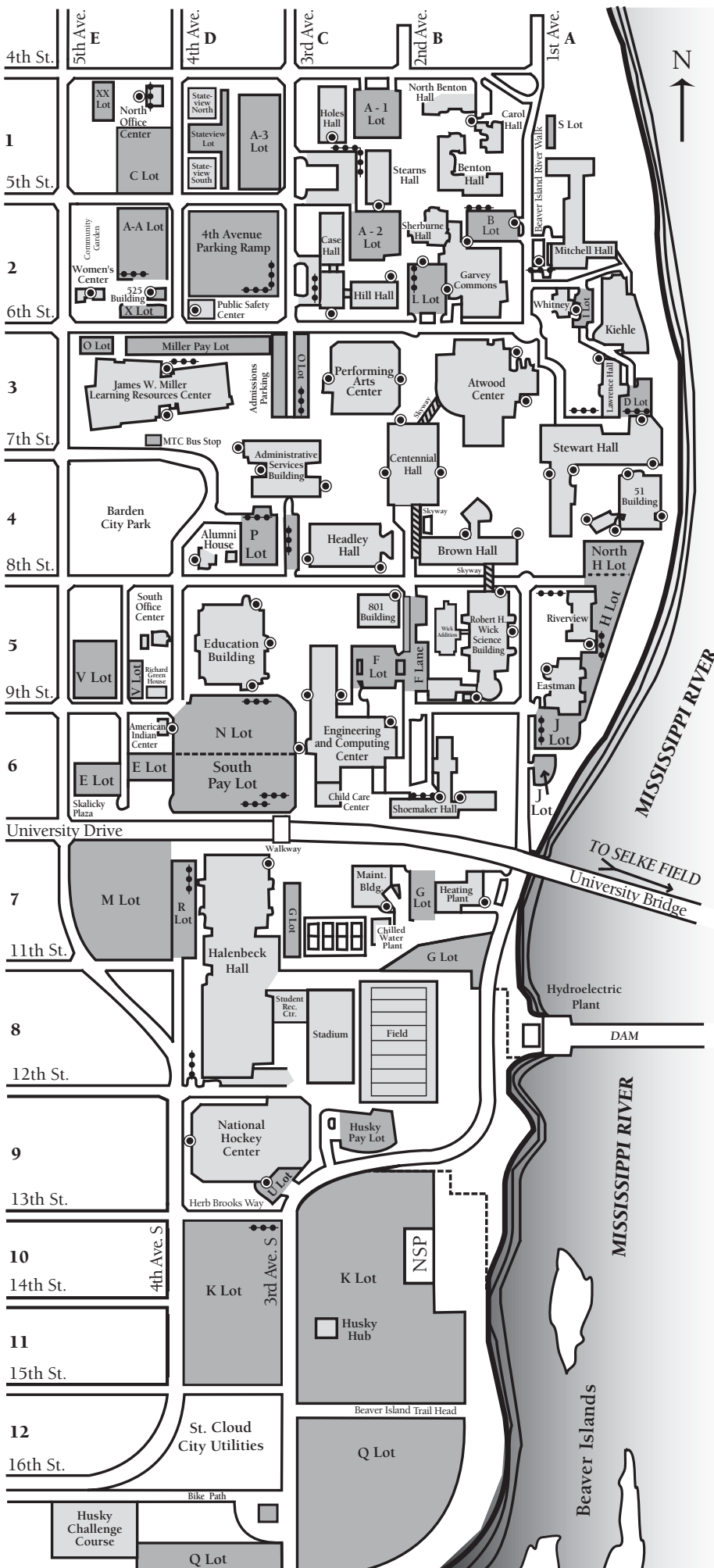
TO REACH THE CAMPUS
