COMMUNICATION SCIENCES AND DISORDERS



JANET TILSTRA completed her Bachelors and Masters degrees at the University of Iowa in Speech-Language Pathology, practiced clinically as a speech-language pathologist and clinical instructor in Seattle, WA and St. Cloud, MN and then completed graduate studies in Educational Psychology. She completed her Ph.D. at the University of Minnesota in 2007, was a Master Literacy Coach with the Minnesota Reading Corps, and taught in the department of Psychology at the College of St. Benedict|St John's University for 7 years. Her areas of interest include children's language, literacy, and cognitive development. Specifically, Dr. Tilstra is interested in processes children use during reading comprehension and construction of written/ spoken narratives and how to measure growth in these skills. Clinically, she serves children with articulation and language impairments, adolescents/young adults with learning and social interaction difficulties, and individuals of all ages with fluency and voice concerns.

COMMUNITY PSYCHOLOGY, COUNSELING & FAMILY THERAPY

STEVEN PELTIER (PH.D., L.P., LMFT) will be teaching in the Marriage and Family Therapy program in the Department of Community Psychology, Counseling, and Family Therapy. He received his Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison and has taught at University of Wisconsin - Whitewater, University of Virginia, and most recently at Saint Mary's University of Minnesota where he was the Marriage and Family Therapy chair for 10 years. He was responsible for significant program expansion to over 400 students in 10 years, leading national accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation for Marriage and Family Therapy Educaton, and developing a doctoral program in Counseling Psychology.

KINESOIOLOGY

PROVOST ACTION GRANTS

In 2013-14, the Provost initiated a program of Provost's Action Grants to fund projects that had been identified by department as part of their efforts towards developing and supporting an "extraordinary education" for our students. These initiatives were funded due to their potential to directly and substantially impact the learning experience for our students. There were 9 SHHS projects funded. Final reports are provided on the 9 completed projects.

Communication Sciences & Disorders

Miller Scholar: "Developing an Interprofessional Practice and Education (IPE) Course for Autism"

Theresa Estrem (lead proposer)

The goal of our Provost Action Grant was to develop an Interprofessional Practice and Education (IPE) Autism Course. The final product was an IPE Autism Summer Camp for children 4-7 years of age. Four departments' (CSD, NURS, CFS, SW) faculty and students used current courses (CSD 648, NURS 418, and CFS 632) to meet discipline-specific student learning outcomes, an Autism Internet Module to prepare students for working with children with autism and their parents, and an IPE workshop to plan activities during the week of the camp. Content in each course also gave students opportunities to develop assessment tools for the IPE Autism Summer Camp, including pre-and post-surveys of parents' and children's social-communication goals and faculty questionnaires about the IPE process and product.

"Undergraduate Research Experience to Promote Student Recruitment and Community Service" G.N. Rangamani (lead proposer)

This action-project supported development and implentation of high-impact experiential-learning. Two groups of undergraduate students took part in this research project. Undergraduate students from the CSD 130 class interviewed 80-90 typically aging individuals on the WHO Quality of Life Questionnaire. The undergraduate senior students who participated in the wellness study worked with 6 typically aging volunteers (age range of 52-72 years) from the community. The students participated in the various assessment and intervention methods of auditory and cognitive processing, and in the research data analysis.

"Teaching and Learning Grant: Evaluating the Effectiveness of the use of iPad Applications for Articulation Therapy in Speech Language Pathology" Jodel Page (lead proposer)

This project provided an opportunity to update technology resources to expand the learning opportunities and assist students to (1) incorporate apps into speech language therphy settings, (2) share common intellectual experiences with other students and faculty specific to the use of technology when providing articulation therapy, (3) participate in community based learning outside of the clinic and classroom. Students identified 2 strengths and 2 areas of need in regards to their personal knowledge and use of technology in providing articulation intervention.

> "Technology for Simulated Client Assessment and Intervention"

Sarah Smits-Bandstra (lead proposer)

The purpose of this project was to develop a state-of-the-art laboratory allowing students to engage in active and applied learning by assessing and treating simulated, and actual patients from the community. The project directly aligned with SCSU's vision of providing "engaged, active learning opportunities," SHHS's vision of "rigorous practical experiences," and CSD's goals to offer "excellence in teaching" and "expand methods of instruction." The existing laboratory was refurbished to accommodate more students, more computers, and new simulated patient software, including a portable laboratory station. Students now have access to 3-D interactive anatomy software, software to record and analyze speech, software to analyze nasal emission and lung volumes, and computer animated patients.

<u>Community Psychology, Counseling,</u> <u>AND FAMILY THERAPY</u>

"Veteran Student Progression and Success" Tina Sacin (lead proposer)

Due to the massive expansion of federal funding in the Post-9/11 G.I. Bill, there is an increased emphasis on Veterans student matriculation and success. For example, recent legislation passed by the Minnesota State Legislature requires that Veteran students receive a positive factor in graduate admissions decisions. Currently, however, SCSU does not have a clear picture of whether its veteran student population is more or less successful than other student populations on campus, or what factors explain veteran student progression and success.

> "Teaching Research and Assessment Classes with Experiential Learning" Shu-Ching Wang (lead proposer)

This project is the result of CETL teaching and learning grant. We collaborated to connect the teaching of a graduate counseling assessment class with an undergraduate research methods class through the experiential learning which requires the use of assessment instruments. We used the assessment instruments for the graduate students to practice testing procedures and the undergraduate students to practice data collection and analysis.

This design provides students in both classes the opportunity to apply classroom knowledge to practica use. We are presenting the results of this project to further the discussion of collaboration between instructors.

"Intensive Research Opportunities for Undergraduate Students in CPSY" Benjamin Witts (lead proposer)

In Fall 2014 and Spring 2015, a 2-semester course sequence was provided to 5 exceptional undergraduate students in CPSY interested in pursuing graduate work in their respective fields of interest. The course covered admission basics, assisted in preparing application materials, and culminated in a independent honors research project to use as a stepping stone to gain better chances of admission. Of the students who applied for graduate school, 100% were accepted.

GERONTOLOGY

"Developing Empathy for Working with Older Adults" Phyllis A. Greenberg (lead proposer)

With the funds we received, we were able to purchase an additional set of low vision simulator goggles, two Empathy Lungs, disposable airway restriction masks, and disposable airway mouth pieces for use with the lungs. We have used

these items to develop empathy for working with older adults for students in Gerontology, Communication Sciences and Disorders, Social Work, Community Health, and Counseling classes. We have also used them in demonstrations during Careers in Aging Week and with several community partners and for the Community Engagement Fair.

<u>Kinesiology</u>

"International Health Curricular and Research Initiatives in South Africa" Laura Finch (lead proposer)

Laura Finch, Chair, Kinesiology and Rebecca Crowell, Chair, Communication Sciences and Disorders, traveled to Nelson Mandela Metropolitan University in Port Elizabeth, South Africa in February. The purpose of our grant was to explore collaborations with NMMU, focusing on international health which is required for programs in both departments. Professional partnerships and curricular options were identified that would enable our students to spend a semester studying abroad at NMMU. Numerous discipline-focused possibilities are available to our students and faculty, including major-specific courses, research, and experiential learning opportunities, both at NMMU and in the surrounding communities. Based on the abundance of partnerships with NMMU, curricular proposals will be developed in 2015-16 to more smoothly integrate international health into our curricula.

UPDATES

SHHS 111: INTRO TO HEALTH & HUMAN SERVICES

This summer, the School of Health and Human Services taught SHHS 111: Introduction to Health and Human Services to a group of 15 middle and high school aged students from the St. Cloud area. These students came to campus and learned about our programs from faculty as part of the Health Career Service Academy.

Students participated in interactive sessions,

learning about Communication Sciences and Disorders, Community Psychology, Counseling, and Family Therapy, Gerontology, Kinesiology, Medical Laboratory Science, Nursing, and Social Work. Students also had the opportunity to tour many of our spaces on campus, including the Nursing Simulation Lab and Speech-Language and Hearing Clinic. Having these students on campus was an exciting experience for both them and our faculty and staff. As one student told us after the class ended about what could be improved, he would like "more teachers and more time to learn."

SHHS 111 is being offered this fall to current SCSU students, exploring majors within our school.

The inaugural year of the Pre-Nursing Living Learning Community (LLC) is off to a great start! On Thursday, August 20, 27 new freshmen students, interested in Nursing, moved in to Shoemaker Hall. These students have chosen to live on the same residence hall floor and take common coursework, all of
