

My Experience as a COLL 150 Graduate Teaching Assistant

This past semester, I had the unique privilege of being a part of the re-designed CEEP 681 group practicum course. Through the experience, my cohort mates and I were graduate teaching assistants (TA) for a first-year course called "Discovering the College Experience," which focused on serving students who were a part of St. Cloud State University's Academic Collegiate Excellence (ACE) program. Over the course of the semester, I was able to lead my own small group of four students through discussions and activities on navigating campus life and resources, personal identity development, and cultivating awareness of and fostering skills related to diversity, equity, and inclusion. Through my experience as a graduate TA, I



was able to strengthen numerous facilitation skills, ranging from cultivating rapport with and amongst small group members by utilizing intergroup dialogue techniques to help build a network of peer support and a sense of belonging on-campus, encouraging reflection and meaning-making of students' curricular and co-curricular experiences, and the value in having a toolbox of questions to prompt further reflection and discussion. I am looking forward to continuing to strengthen all of these small group facilitation skills and incorporating them into my future work. In addition to my role as a small group facilitator, I had the great pleasure of being a lead TA twice throughout the semester. Through my experience as a lead TA, I was able to co-create lesson plans and co-facilitate large group learning and discussions with one of my cohort mates. As a whole, my time as a graduate TA

Not only have I gained relevant facilitation skills that will help me be successful in my future career in student affairs, but I was able to be a part of each of my small group members' journeys during the first semester of their undergraduate education. Being able to bear witness to their individual experiences and the opportunity to aid in their growth and development has been a phenomenal and heartwarming experience. Not only was I able to guide my small group members through reflecting critically on topics of diversity, equity, and inclusion, I was also able to learn from them through the experiences, wonderful connections, and thoughts they shared. I am truly grateful for the ability to be a part of the re-designed group practicum course. All that I have learned from my time as a graduate TA will be carried with me as I move through the final semester of the program and beyond as I look to begin my career as a career counselor.



Internships are an integral part of the CCSD master's program. Finding the right internship is essential; some students want to maximize their experience in one area, while others look to get complimentary experience to support and supplement the work that they have already done. There are significant advantages to completing an internship; from providing students with practical experience in real-world settings to narrowing down the kinds of positions that students will be looking for upon graduation. Through the internship component of the CCSD master's program, students have the opportunity to network with various student affairs professionals in the field, develop skills around professionalism and navigating work-place dynamics, as well as receive and respond to feedback from on-site supervisors. Internships help CCSD students understand their strengths as emerging student affairs professionals and provides them with opportunities to work on areas of growth, all while engaging them in meaningful experiential learning.

CCSD Alum Spotlight

A conversation between Sabrina Yang (1st year CCSD student and CCSD Graduate Assistant) and Bee Vang (CCSD Class of 2010) about Vang's role as TRIO Upward Bound Director at the University of Wisconsin-River Falls, what it has been like navigating student affairs during COVID-19, and advice for future CCSD graduates...

CCSD GA: What do you do in your current job?

BV: I am the TRIO Upward Bound Director at the University of Wisconsin – River Falls. TRIO programs, funded under Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965, are a national initiative to provide access and opportunity to helps students overcome class, social, academic, and cultural barriers to higher education. Upward Bound serves low-income and/or first-generation high school students in college through tutoring and academic skill-building, social and cultural activities, college and career awareness, and personal and academic counseling. My program strives to cultivate within our students the ability to develop a network of peers,

professionals, and community members to leverage support for post-secondary success. We provide a framework for students to firsthand experience how to do this at the high school level that they carry with them into their future college campus. Early on in my career I took a huge risk and became a Director at 26-years-old, with limited experience. It was a steep learning curve, but I have no regrets.

CCSD GA: How has your CCSD graduate school experience influenced your professional practice in student affairs?

BV: The practical interviewing/counseling skills developed in graduate school still serves me today. The student development theories and philosophies are lenses that I use to develop authentic student-centered programming. Little did I know that the study abroad trip I chaperoned to Laos and Thailand with Multicultural Student Services would serve as a catalyst for me to continue taking students to visit numerous domestic cities; including New York, Seattle, Chicago, Orlando, Boston, and more.

CCSD GA: What have you learned while working during COVID? What is the most challenging obstacle you have faced while navigating through the pandemic? What unexpected innovations or opportunities have you come across during COVID?

BV: When the pandemic closed down schools I referenced to Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs to guide my actions in providing students with COVID-19 resource packs.

BV cont'd: The most challenging and unexpected innovation was developing a six-week virtual summer program early on, informing my participants of the changes, and adapting the program as summer progressed. The most rewarding return was seeing my students stay engaged throughout the summer and for them to be able to earn up to a \$1,200 stipend.

CCSD GA: What advice would you share with Students of Color who are striving to find their place within the field of student affairs?

BV: The work you are striving to do will not happen overnight and you are needed more than you realize. Be ready for the long haul as the legacies that you build will remain long after you have moved on from your role.

CCSD GA: What are some things you wished you knew before graduating that would have served you well after graduating?

BV: I would have considered completing a dual-degree in counseling, built stronger networks among my peers, and practiced salary negotiations.

Amidst two pandemics (COVID-19 and systemic racism) it was my privilege to teach CEEP 658: Multicultural Counseling. Over the course of the semester we critically examined our own positionalities, situating ourselves within inherited systems of power; such as racism, sexism, and classism. We



examined our implicit biases, explored the relevance of cultural humility in engaging and unlearning our own internalized dominance, and studied multiple theoretical perspectives (including critical race theory, intersectionality, and interconnectivity) to inform our work with diverse populations. We practiced mindfulness techniques to stay grounded in our bodies and the present moment, and in spite of an incredibly challenging and unprecedented time in history, together we cultivated radical hope for a more inclusive and socially just future for ourselves and our communities. for jobs at a variety of different universities. She has told me that she is ready to go and adventure out to wherever I can land a job. We are beyond



CCSD & Healthy Huskies

I am thrilled to get the opportunity to share about a new partnership between Healthy Huskies and CCSD! Healthy Huskies has often had Graduate Assistants from CCSD who have expressed how valuable working with students on health and wellness has been to their graduate school experience. Health is a basic human need; educating students about the importance of health and taking care of themselves is important work that we take very seriously.



An emerging trend in College Health Promotion is Wellness Coaching. Healthy Huskies, in partnership with several departments from the School of Health & Human Services, recently began a Wellness Coaching program; a free service for SCSU students to be able to discuss their personal goals in a collaborative and encouraging environment. Wellness coaches are graduate students who are trained in the skill of Motivational Interviewing (MI). MI is a collaborative conversation skill used for strengthening a client's own motivation around a self-determined goal.

This fall 2020 semester, Erica Karger-Gatzow and I have been co-teaching the CEEP 668 helping skills course. We have spent eight weeks teaching the core skills of MI. This has prepared current 1st year CCSD students for their spring 2021 individual practicum, which will be with Wellness Coaching! The CCSD students will get to implement the MI skills they have learned while coaching this spring. It has been a rewarding experience getting to teach in the program that provided me the strong foundation in student affairs on which my career has grown. MI is a valuable skill for anyone working in student affairs. It focuses on strengthening a client's own intrinsic motivation to change. MI is unique in the fact that it places emphasis on client's "WHY", before jumping to the how or planning phase. I encourage anyone working in student affairs to explore MI; it has positively changed how I work with students on a daily basis. Wellness Coaching is using MI skills and strategies to help students achieve their personal goals and to increase student belongingness at SCSU. Recent assessment data of our program reveal that 91% of students would recommend Wellness Coaching to other students and 80% have been able to maintain their positive behavior change because of Wellness Coaching. We are delighted to partner with CCSD graduate students as we continue to grow the SCSU Wellness Coaching Program. Take care, stay safe, and be well!
