Belinda is now serving as a U.S. State Department Youth Ambassador and is one of 75 USA Pavilion Youth Ambassadors representing the United States at the World's Fair, Expo 2020 Dubai. As part of her duties, she welcomes visitors, U.S. officials, and international delegates to the USA Pavilion, and shares information about the U.S. history, culture and diverse populations with thousands of visitors from all around the world. CCSD Alum Spotlight

An interview with Brandon Byrd (CCSD Class of 2020), Resident Director at the University of California, Los Angeles

CCSD: Please tell us a bit about your current job and what you love most about it.

Brandon: I've recently transitioned from the University of New Hampshire to the University of California, Los Angeles. I'm currently working as a Resident Director in the Office of Residential Life. I oversee two buildings on the Hill, which houses about 900+ students. My day-to-day usually involves several administrative tasks, student conduct meetings, 1-on-1s with my student staff, and supervising a paraprofessional staff member. I also sit on the Engagement Advisory Team and Geek Week committees. My favorite aspect of my current role is working with my student staff. I was lucky to get such a great group of students. It's been amazing seeing them grow in their RA roles and meeting their personal goals. I get so much joy from them stopping by my office to tell me about passing a difficult exam or having a meaningful interaction with their residents.

CCSD: How has your CCSD education prepared you for your career in student affairs?

Brandon: I'm very thankful for the variety of courses and practical experiences that were offered during my time in CCSD. I've found myself using a lot of the skills acquired from the counseling procedures class and multicultural counseling. I think one of the most important lessons I picked up while in the CCSD program was meeting students where they currently are at. We can't expect all the students we encounter to be on the same playing field as our society is set up to disenfranchise certain populations. By learning this I've been able to really adapt my approach with students of varying backgrounds.

CCSD: In the pandemic, many student affairs educators have come to recognize (now, perhaps more than ever) the importance of self-care. How do you practice self-care? What tips or suggestions would you share with our current master's students about balancing their many commitments with their own personal wellness?

Brandon: The best thing I've done was taking my work email off my personal cell phone. That forced me to create boundaries in my work setting as I'm not as easily accessible after leaving the office. Besides that, I've gotten into SoulCycle, exploring the greater Los Angeles area, and building a community at work with whom I can share frustrations with and not feel judged. For the current CCSDers, please make sure that you're communicating with your supervisors about workloads and your capacity. Practice having those conversations now because in the field it will be imperative for you to let your supervisor know if/when you don't have the capacity to be on two different university committees, run a week's worth of events, meet with 30+ students, and still manage three longstanding projects. You need to be able to advocate for your mental and physical wellbeing. Also, blocking off time in your work schedule to finish administrative tasks will change the game for you.

CCSD: Anything else you'd like to share?

Brandon: Take advantage of the internship experience and try to get one at a different type of institution, whether it's private, a community college, or something else. Look for an internship that will give you the opportunity to have your hands in a multitude of things.

Reflection by: Samantha Yang, 2nd year CCSD student

It was great to work with Mai Xiong (CCSD Class of 2020) and Tony Yang (CCSD Class of 2019) on NASPA4E presentation and to hear how their experiences were similar to and different from mine. In working on the presentation, I reflected on my own experiences as a college student, particularly my student leadership experience and using Yosso's (2005) Community Cultural Wealth to find strengths within my experiences. I found that it was very powerful to share my experience and have the language to be able to describe my experiences. It was a great professional development opportunity to present at the NASPA IV-East conference. It was a very powerful moment for me to speak about my own experiences as a Hmong college student and how that identity relates to my experience as a student affairs educator. It was important that my co-presenters and I spoke about Hmong college students because the Hmong



student population is often overlooked when institutions do not disaggregate data on Asian Americans in higher education. There are many specific resources that can help Hmong college students be successful in their journey. It was also important that we presented to provide space for student affairs educators to continue the conversation on how to best support Hmong college students and other ethnic student identities.

Pursuing a CCSD Thesis

Q&A between Dr. Ashlee and Alyssa Duncan, 2nd year CCSD student

Dr. Ashlee: What is your thesis about?

Alyssa: My thesis is centered around students with disabilities. The qualitative study will explore students with disabilities' experiences and perceptions navigating college. Specifically, my thesis will explore how universal design is used in the classroom and students' interactions with faculty.



Dr. Ashlee: How did you get interested in this research topic?

Alyssa: I have had a passion for working with people who have disabilities for a while now, not only because of my own disabilities but also my past work experience at a day training habilitation site where I did case management and direct support for adults with disabilities. This sparked my interest in social justice work for the community. When I entered CCSD, I found a passion for continuing this work with and for people with disabilities, just in a different capacity. I was also thrilled to be able to work in a disability support office for my internship, where my thesis research is being conducted. After working with my internship supervisor, this topic was a great fit to improve the office/campus and aligned with literature I had been reading.

Dr. Ashlee: What has been the most rewarding and challenging part of your thesis experience so far?

Alyssa: Autonomy has been both the most challenging and rewarding part of my thesis experience. I appreciate my independence and how rewarding it is to complete this project, and it is challenging to motivate myself to do the work! Some days reading a ton of research hasn't been the most appealing. With the autonomy, I have learned a lot about my own internal processing and am learning when to ask for help. I am proud that I have been able to experience this self-growth and found the motivation and energy to do this project.

Dr. Ashlee: Do you have any tips or advice for other CCSD students who may be considering pursuing a thesis?


Alyssa: Talk to someone about this route! It was very helpful for me to talk to multiple people about the thesis route before committing to it. This way you can learn the pros and cons about the process as you consider whether it makes sense for your CCSD experience.



As a first semester CCSD student, I was honored to be accepted to present at the 2021 MN ACPA conference. In line with this year's theme of Systemic Change in Higher Education: What's Your Role?, I presented a session titled "How can I help?: Understanding underrepresented minorities' STEM education journey." In my presentation, I discussed the perceived difficulty of a STEM major, which may deterred minoritized students from pursuing a STEM degree. I also addressed the vicious cycle in which lack of appropriate resources and encouragement from higher education personnel, may serve as additional barriers for underrepresented minorities in STEM.

Through my session, I provided insights into why this happens and how we as student affairs professionals can improve admission and retention of underrepresented students in STEM fields. I am so grateful to Dr. Ashlee for her encouragement and valuable feedback, which empowered me to connect the dots in our Social Justice & Student Development class and gave me the language, conceptual knowledge, and confidence to convey my passion for uplifting minoritized student populations in STEM at post-secondary institutions.


Celebrating Our CCSD Students
