

Before we get into the library's resources, I want to take a couple of minutes for y'all to think about your own experience and skills with finding, evaluating, writing about resources.


I think it's important to take this kind of inventory so you know where to focus your energy

Here's a diagram of the research process. You can find many different versions of this, some with more steps while others have fewer steps.

Your options are:

Understand assignment & choose a topic Conduct background research to focus your topic Find & select articles, books, & websites Read & evaluate your selected resources Incorporate research into your draft, cite sources Present your research



We can help you save time at the find and select articles, books, and websites stage.

Graduate student often don't have a lot of time to spend searching for research. You've got to get to the reading and writing part as quickly as possible because they take the most time.

Tools for Getting Started

- Use Campus Card to borrow physical materials
- Click on the Library Card button to access your account LIBRARY CARD
 - See items you have checked out
 - Verify due dates
 - Renew items
- Use StarID and password to access online materials from off campus


Before you do anything with the Library, you'll need two tools.

You will need a Campus Card to use our physical materials
The Library Card button on the Library's website is how you can see what you've got checked out and to renew items
You can have up to 50 items checked out at a time,
Graduate students can check out books for 56 days
We send due date reminders to your SCSU email address

You will use your StarID to access online materials.



Your laptop is going to be your best friend during graduate school. And finding resources to support your research starts online.



Interlibrary loan

In the academic library world, we're on the smaller side and don't' have access to the same materials you would find at the University of Minnesota. However, libraries help each other out through a service called Interlibrary Loan.

I anticipate most of your III requests will be for articles and that service is working smoothly

We have recently resumed III service for books. There may be some delays in getting the books. The books will be quarantined at the lending library's location first and then sent to us. Once we get them, you will receive a notice it's arrived.




Moving on. I mentioned earlier that we have a guide for you to explore.



On the citation styles link, we note some resources Mendely and Zotero that can help you organize your resources. Enable you to integrate citations into your works.

Try them both out. If they don't work for you, move on. But you need to figure out something that works for you.

I want to talk a bit about Research consultations

Individualized meetings

- Online
- Plan your search strategy for literature review
- Identify specific, relevant sources targeted to your project, saving you time
- Use library tools effectively, finding the information you need when you need it



Librarians can help you find the right tool to use to find the resources you need.



This happens in like all consultations, sometimes the trick to finding resources is knowing the right words used in your discipline. You know how you'll learn this words?



Yep, you'll learn the terminology, the methods, and theories through the reading you'll do








Library building hours:
