Student Callers

- The callers came from the classes of Drs. Frank, Zerbib, and Wagner.
- Student directors conducted both general training sessions and one-on-one training sessions as well as monitored all calling shifts. Faculty directors monitor all training and calling. Student callers are asked to sign a statement of ethics dealing with respondent interviewing.

SCSU Survey Lab

- The SCSU Survey operates a Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) Lab on the St. Cloud State University campus. The CATI Lab is equipped with 19 interviewer stations; each includes a computer, a phone, and a headset. In addition to the interviewer stations, there is the Supervisor Station, which is used to monitor the survey while it is in progress. The SCSU Survey has its own server designated solely for the use of the SCSU Survey.
- The SCSU Survey is licensed to use Sawtooth Software's Ci3 Questionnaire Authoring Version 5.0, a state-of-the-art windows-based computer-assisted interviewing package. This program allows us to develop virtually any type of questionnaire while at the same time programming edit and consistency checks and other quality control measures to ensure the most valid data. The instrument was pre-tested prior to interviewing to make certain that all equipment and programming was in working order and to verify that the questionnaire was clear.

The Calling

- The sample was obtained from David Kosel, Center for Information Systems
- Findings are based on telephone interviews with a representative sample of currently enrolled SCSU students.
- Before calling began, the original sample was comprised of 2000 students, including 500 dorm residents and 1,500 off-campus residents.
- The sample included both landline phones and cell phones.
- Interviews were conducted from March 12th to March 18th, 2012.
- Calls were made at various times during the week (Sunday through Thursday, 4:30 to 9:30) to maximize contacts and ensure equal opportunities to respond.


Sample Error

- •510 respondents completed the survey.
- The margin of sampling error for the complete set of weighted data is ±4 percent at the 95 percent confidence level.
- Then analysis is made of sub-samples such as respondent gender, dorm residence, etc., the sample error may be larger.

Cooperation and Response Rate

- The cooperation rate for the survey was 71%.
- The cooperation rate is determined by dividing the number of completed interviews (510), by the total of completed interviews, partial interviews, and refusals (total = 721).
- The overall response rate for the survey was 32%.
- The response rate is determined by dividing the number of completed interviews (510), by the total of completed interviews, partial interviews, refusals, non-contacts, plus 90% of the cases with unknown eligibility (total = 1679).


Do you think SCSU is on the right track or whether you think SCSU is going in the wrong direction?

Who would students vote for in the 2012 Presidential






Obama vs. Republican Candidates: Santorum, Romney, Gingrich, and Paul


 We created four hypothetical elections where Obama was on the ballot against one of the four prominent Republican candidates that are vying for the Presidential candidacy.

We randomized the order of the questions.


Barack Obama vs. Rick Santorum




Barack Obama vs. Mitt Romney


Do students feel safe on campus at night?


Noteworthy Findings:

- No significant difference between:
 - Ethnic Groups
 - Dorm vs. Off Campus Residents
 - Class Standing
- There was a significant difference between different age groups, but there were too many subgroups to conclude that correlation existed.




What are students self-reported drinking habbits?



How many days during a typical week do you consume one or more alcoholic beverages?







2012 results of the amount of drinks a student drinks when they consume alcohol appears to be consistent with results from the past years when this question was asked.








"Goal 7. Human Diversity





"Is it important that SCSU maintains a diversity requirement for graduation"




Note-Worthy Points

 - No significant difference between:
 - Dorms and off campus residents
 - Year in school

While there were differences between white students and students of color for each of the previous questions, the overwhelming majority both groups agree that SCSU provides a safe racial environment and that SCSU should continue to require the diversity requirement.

Feeling Thermometer



Feeling Thermometer Questions

Please think of a thermometer that has a range of 0 to 100 degrees. I'd like you to rate your feelings toward some terms and other groups who are in the news. Ratings on the thermometer between 50 and 100 degrees mean that you feel favorable and warm toward the term or group. Ratings between 0 and 50 degrees mean that you do not feel too favorable towards the term or group. If we come to a term you don't know or recognize, you don't need to rate it. Just tell me and we will move on to the next one. If you do recognize the term, but do not feel particularly warm or cold toward the term, you would rate the term at the 50 degree mark.

Feeling Thermometer Mean








Wall Street Mean




Wall Street & Occupy Wall Street





Vending Machine Break Down



Water Bottle Bans


- St. Ben's is 1 of 90 colleges in the United Sates, and first in Minnesota, to implement a water bottle policy.

- Los Angeles wrestles with the issue as City Council has studied this for more than four years.








Plastic bag recycling versus paper bag use.

How frequently have you felt unfairly treated by a Professor at SCSU?






As you may know, as of August 1 of this year St. Cloud State University will be a tobacco-free campus. Exceptions will be made in accordance with the Minnesota Clean Indoor Air Act, which will allow tobacco use in traditional Native American ceremonies, scientific studies and theatrical productions. Further, tobacco use will be permitted inside private motor vehicles on university property as long as tobacco users demonstrate respect for individuals and the environment. Which of the follow course of action regarding the SCSU smoking policy do you support:

- 1. Implement the policy going into effect August 1st
